# Chaplain's Corner

Presently, members of the Council are engaged with the Committee of Decent Literature of St. Michael's Church in their efforts to wipe out smut from the news stands of Union. This is an effort in which EVERY KNIGHT should actively participate. In order to be effective, you should know something about the situation.

The increase of the sale of smut, on a national scale, brings returns greater than that of General Motors. These monies are used in all the avenues of crime. The criminal leaders are in active cooperation with the leaders of Communism—one of whose means of overthrowing the United States is through the breakdown of the moral fibre of the people, especially the young.

Our local committee has made its first approach to the dealers in Union, and we have found only two, of more than thirty merchants, willing to co-operate. Our program is one of advising which publications are objectionable. The members of the committee will check the stands each month. When a stand is found clean, a certificate will be posted at the magazine rack. We need the entire Council to be vocal with their newsdealers, and explain that they will not continue to patronize unless they remove smut from the stands.

For too long a time now, we have not engaged our enemy, under the delusion that nothing could be done. With the testimony of authorities indicating that our juvenile delinquency is on the rise, no one can excuse himself from his best effort to wipe out this Cancer in our moral life.

## SAFE DRIVING CORNER

When is a man most dangerous? It is when he is behind the wheel of an automobile. It is the Machine Age, not the Atomic Age, which has given man his most lethal instrument—the automobile. Atomic and hydrogen bombs rain death and destruction when man is provoked to war, the automobile brings pain, destruction and death in the course of ordinary, everyday life.

It is not that the automobile is an infernal machine, quite the contrary, it has been one of our greatest boons. However, it is a machine, and like all devices of human making, the good or evil it can do depends upon the disposition of the person operating it.

In most traffic accidents, the guilty party is man, not machine; mind, and not motor; reflex, and not roadway. It is human error which, each year, kills nearly 40,000 people, and maims hundreds of thousands. Sane, peace-loving, kindly Christians who want to save a few seconds, who get wrapped up in conversation, or who just don't think, turn out to be man-killers in the twinkling of an eye. When the tragedy has happened, they are sorry beyond words. They didn't mean to do it, but they have killed-and sinned against God and their neighbor.
