

# **NEVER TO LAUGH OR LOVE . . .**

## OR TASTE THE SUMMERTIME?



**ABORTION** 

1. If we would form an adequate concept of the sacredness of human life, we must take into consideration the creator of life, the reason for our living and our ultimate end.

SACREDNESS OF HUMAN LIFE

God created man, with his specific nature and wonderful powers of body and soul, and He is his final end.

Man is a biological creature, a sentient being, but primarily a rational being; composed of body and spirit. He has intelligence and free will, capable of making decisions. He has the ability to think, write poetry, compose musical scores and invent complex mechanisms for the betterment of society. He can enter into relationship with God and that constitutes religion. God gave man liberty to serve Him and to do His will. Man can move freely towards the goal ordained for him by God, or he can refuse to move towards it.

2. Man — a creature composed of body and soul and made to the image and likeness of God — was created to love, honor and obey God and to be happy with Him here on earth and forever in Heaven. Only by understanding the purpose of our creation can we shape our lives in living properly and working in behalf of our fellowman. Many individuals find themselves in a quandary because they fail to understand the true meaning of life, its purpose and its destiny.

3. To understand the purpose of life we notice that there exists in the nature of man a strong desire for happiness; he is constantly searching for happiness. Everything he does, he does under the guise of searching for happiness.

The purpose of human life, then, is to act in such a way here as to prepare for union with God hereafter, where one can obtain perfect happiness. Since man is destined for eternal happiness in Heaven, he must prepare himself by his acts here below and he must have the MEANS to do so. The means God has given to us is called RIGHTS. He gave them to us because we need them in order to serve Him and attain our end.

4. Pope Pius XI in his encyclical on Atheistic Communism cites these rights: "Man has a spiritual and immortal soul. He is a person, marvelously endowed by his Creator with gifts of body and mind... God alone is his last end in this life and the next. In consequence he has been endowed by God with many and varied prerogatives: the right to life, to bodily integrity, to the necessary means of existence: the right to tend towards his ultimate goal in the path marked out for him by God; the right of association and the right to possess and use property."

These rights are inalienable. They may not be taken from man unjustly; they are bestowed by nature and nature's Author, that is, God. Civil society exists to protect these rights and man must realize that the use of these rights is subject to authority for the sake of the common good.

5. The sacredness of life is understood in terms of man's intrinsic worth and his destiny. He possesses the faculty of reason and must, therefore, choose those acts which will prepare him for the destiny that awaits him in heaven. One's life and integrity, both physical and mental, must be maintained. The first and foremost inalienable right is that of life and physical existence. The right to existence is primary and the source of all other natural rights.

6. No one, individual or State, may unjustly limit or take away this right to bodily integrity. One of the deepest urges of all living creatures is self-preservation and this law of self-preservation obliges every man to use all ordinary means to preserve life and health. Not to do so is equivalent to destroying life. Throughout society we see widespread abuse of God's laws. Bodily integrity is disturbed by the practice of abortion, suicides, euthanasia, sterilization, etc. Since man is the stewart of his corporeal life, he must take every reasonable precaution to preserve life and the integrity of his body.

You can speak for this child and others like him who have no voice. Write your government and representative now and cast your vote AGAINST liberalized abortion laws. IT WILL COST YOU ONLY EIGHT CENTS IN POSTAGE. Don't leave this fight for the next person. It is your voice that is important. Unless you pick up your pen now, thousands of children will die and end up in the incinerators of our hospitals.

It's your choice now . . . for all times.

One of the most important contributions a Council can make to the life of its community is the example given by its members in their religious, social and business lives.



### "Inner Feelings"


