

Union Council Degree Champs

Union Council's officers, lead by P.G.K. John Winters won the state wide competition for the best Admission Degree Team for the 1974-75 term. This is our second year in a row for this honor. The Supreme Council Award for the Admission Degree also was given to our team. At the October 13th regular meeting John Winters presented to G.K. Andrew Popp the trophy that comes with the award. Many hours of work are needed to present degrees for new members. To be the best in the state reflects the successful use of this time by our officers. Congratulations on a job well done.

Time and Money

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (NC) — According to the results of an annual survey, the Knights of Columbus gave more than five million man-hours in community service and donated almost \$11 million to charitable causes in 1974.

Approximately **68 percent** of the society's branches responded to the questionnaire, which was sent to its 62 state councils, 5,904 local councils and 1,365 fourth-degree assemblies.

Supreme Knight John W. McDevitt reported the breakdown of the poll, which was taken in conjunction with the National Fraternal Congress of American (NFCA). The NFCA, head-quartered in Chicago, is an organization of almost 100 fraternal benefit societies in the U.S. and Canada.

The charitable donations of \$10,960,727, included \$969,875 from the Knights' Supreme Council, top legislative and policymaking body of the 1.2 million-member society of Catholic men.

The total encompassed donations to the needy, sick, disabled and handicapped of \$2.46 million; aid to victims of disasters of over \$212,000; and donations to homes for the aged, hospitals and youth institutions of \$1.71 million. Donations to welfare organizations, community projects and civic organizations were \$2.1 million, and donations for educational purposes, scholarships, schools and libraries came to \$2.21 million.

In addition, donations of food, clothing and other items were valued at \$850,000, and miscellaneous donations totaled \$430,000. Youth and juvenile works received \$1.41 million in the activity disbursements.

The survey also showed that the knights made 434,634 visits to the sick and bereaved; contributed 103,339 donations of blood; gave 5,100,053 hours in community service to youth, hospitals, orphanages and churches; and spent 462,903 hours in service to the sick, disabled and their families.

The figures reflected only the contributions and activities of those branches that responded to the survey.
