RIGHT TO PRY?

Does a citizen's right to privacy supercede the Government's need for information? This is a question which we will have to face in 1970 when the government plans its next census-taking. The Census Bureau plans on including 120 mandatory questions in the census, failure of which to answer would carry a possible \$100 fine or 60-day jail sentence.

In the 90th Congress a bill was introduced to limit the manadatory questions to seven to wit: Name and address, relationship of head of household, sex, date of birth, race or color, marital status, and visitors in the home at the time of census.

That bill died in subcommittee though sponsored by 47 congressmen. Plans are to reintroduce it this coming session.

The purpose of the census is to count people - not T.V. sets or toilets. We all know that information transmitted to any governmental agency has a way of finding its way into private hands. This move towards Orwellianism should be stopped at the grass-roots - by you. Write your Congressman.






KRESKIN PUTS COUNCIL UNDER SPELL
