

PUBLIC DECENCY

"Obscene material is an important contributing factor in juvenile detinquency. This kind of material exposes young minds to temptation, stimulates the most primitive teelings and impulses, and leads astray in thought and behavior. Indecent photographs of women also cause teenagers to feel that women are not to be respected as persons, but as luxury prizes distinguished chiefly by sexy attributes, rather than by any ideal of womanhood."—Philadelphia psychiatrist, Dr. A. M. Ornsteen.

The cancer eating at the vitals of a potentially great society is not dormant. It is malignant.

We are now actively campaigning for the passage of BILL A-768 in the New Jersey Legislature. This bill if passed by the Assembly, the Senate, and signed by Governor Hughes would become law, and would define obscenity in the law known as: The Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey, Chapter 115. INDECENCY AND OBSCENITY, Section 2A:115. Those who would be found quilty in a court of law for violation of this law would be subject to penalties of: not more than a fine of \$1,000 or three years in prison, or both in the case of a misdemeanor; and not more than a fine of \$2,000 or seven years in prison, or both in the case of a high misdemeanor involving a child under 18 years of age.

The New Jersey Assembly on May 24, 1965 by a 55-0 unanimous vote of those present passed Bill A-768 and sent it to the New Jersey Senate, Five of the sixty members of the Assembly were absent and/or did not vote for Bill A-768.

Our 21 New Jersey Senators did not move on Bill A-768 on May 24, 1965, thereby insuring another profitable summer business boom for the Perversion for Profit Racket at the expense of the children of New Jersey.

WRITE NOW: Letters to the Governor and the 21 N. J. Senators will bring results. Present a few of your own comments and ask for an immediate session of the N. J. Senate to debate Bill A-768 as the first order of business of the New Jersey Assembly and without amendments.
