## Positive Thinking

At a special meeting on Tuesday, April 21, over 130 members of the Aqua Knights swim club unanimously approved to go ahead with construction of the pool this year and, if necessary, to balance any membership shortage by equally sharing the deficit, up to a set maximum per member, payable August 1, 1964. This money will be repaid when funds become available from new members.

Passing of the resolution followed after an extensive discussion by the members and committee in which John Guidera reiterated that the committee's aim is to maintain the cost of membership as originally outlined at a bond of \$250 plus yearly operating cost of \$65. The swim club anticipates sufficient filling of the membership quota in time to eliminate any deficit or reduce it to a small amount.

Our hard-working swim club chairman Bill Stuart who conducted the meeting said that this vote of confidence permits the committee to move ahead without delay toward the pool opening target date of July 1 of this year. Fred Vollherbst and grand-knight Bill Taylor also addressed the meeting.

The first 300 Knights of Columbus from Union and neighboring councils will be charter members of the swim club. Have you considered joining? 


