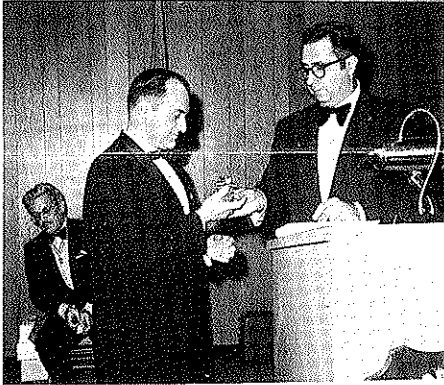

Past Grand Knight Bob Armstrong, accompanied by his wife Marie, two daughters Kathy and Terry and his son Bob, was honored on Nov. 27th at the Honor Ball Dinner and Dance.

Bob became the 13th Grand Knight of Union Council after progressing through the chairs from Outside Guard. During his term as Grand Knight, he won for the Council the Papal Tribute for Membership, a most noteworthy achievement.

Since becoming a Knight, time and again Bob has demonstrated his unique ability for leadership and administration.

Bob has served on the Catholic Activities Committee and Fraternal Activities Committee and has been Chairman of the Council Activities Committee and the Membership and Insurance Committee, his pet project.

These two worthy groups exist mainly through the efforts of organizations and dedicated citizens who take their time and effort to plan programs for their support.

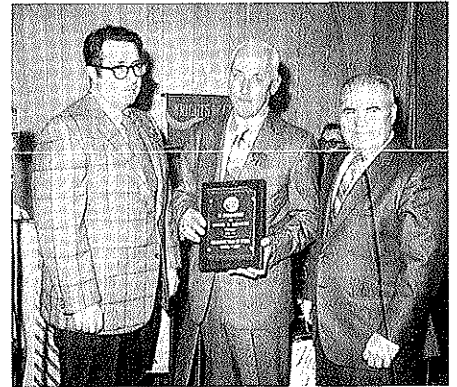

Why a Conservation Committee?

It is doubtful that all or even a majority of our members know that such a committee exists in Union Council. That those who do know of its existence are aware of its purpose is problematic.

When we speak generally of conservation, the thought of our mighty forests, lakes, rivers, and natural resources come to mind. Yes, this is conservation. The K. of C. leaves this type of conservation to the knowledgeable experts on this subject.

Our conservation is somewhat different in that we deal with brother Knights or shall we say Knights Errant? Our committee members do not claim to be experts on the subject but as the saying goes "they will have to do until someone better comes along."

To get to the meat of the subject the purpose of the conservation committee is to conserve our membership. Primarily, it is our duty, by direction of the Grand Knight, to contact those brothers who have inadvertently become delinquent in the payment of their dues. We say inadvertently, since we are naive enough to think that a Knight of Columbus would never deliberately allow his obligations to his Council and the Order lapse into such a state.

This does not mean we condone this lethargy on the part of these unthinking brothers. This sort of lackadaisical attitude toward ones obligations places an added burden in at least two separate places. First, the Financial Secretary must send out a notice of payment due, prior to this quarter. Should the brother choose to ignore this notice — (If all the dues notices that brothers claim they never received were laid end to end we could pave a road to the moon with them), the Financial Secretary must now send a second notice and a third notice, if necessary. The chronic delinquent — we do have quite a few — has thus cost the council 15¢ and some valuable time. Multiply this by the usual 200 or so members per quarter who invariably forget to pay and we have anywhere from \$25 to \$50 in postage.

This is only one quarterly notice. Now multiply this by 4 and you may readily understand why we are concerned. The Financial Secretary has written some 1000 extra notices. For those of you who are inclined to write this off as a minor chore, try sitting down and writing your name, address, date and an amount of money on a piece of paper some 200 times. Think about this. One light slap on the face would mean little, but suppose you were to receive 200 slaps? I suspect this would become rather annoying, don't you agree?

Sponsorship Obligations

Are you considering sponsoring a new member? If so, you must be willing to accept certain responsibilities. You should know that your candidate is a practical Catholic gentleman and that he will value his membership by active participation in our council's fine programs. Show the candidate your interest in him by escorting him to the Council when he is notified of his interview. Extend him the courtesy of being present at his Degree ceremonies.

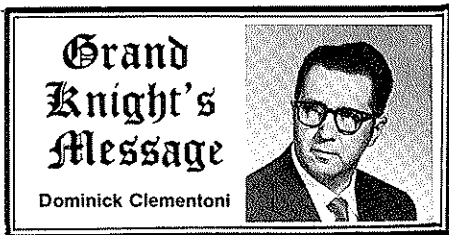
