5,000.00 — Higher . . . 5,200.00 — Higher . . . 5,500.00 — Higher . . . . 5,800.00 — That's it!




Over and over again, the old lady repeated the same plea in a loud voice. One of the town's worst characters, overhearing her supplication, decided to play a trick on her.



The Easter Bunny left over 300 eggs and assorted chocolates for the children. There were regular chocolate eggs, both solid and hollow, Cadbury cream-filled eggs, prize eggs, milk-chocolate bunnies, and chocolate bunny pops. 
