At a special meeting held on April 30, 1958, the Council conferred the First Degree on the following: Gus Armstrong, Robert Mathais, Koloman Dolgas, Robert Hartnett, Raymond O'Day, John Burke, John McGirr, John Plews, Thomas Hanlon Jr.

In May, the Council voted to donate the receipts of the Beggars Bowl to St. Mary's Priory in New Haven, Conn. as a tribute to Father McGiveny, the founder of the K. of C. The priory had been gutted by fire. The first meeting of the Knights of Columbus was held in the basement of this church. The donation amounted to \$35.00.

An additional \$25.00 per delegate was voted on and passed bring the total allotment to \$75.00 per delegate to the State Convention.

A Major degree was held on Saturday, May 10, 1958, at Westfield Council.

At the second meeting in May the receipts of the Beggars Bowl were donated to the Multiple Sclerosis Fund. The Lecturer was directed to send \$10.00 to Camp Columbus director, Ted Osbahr to defray the cost of sending one orphan to camp.

It was agreed by the Council to hire Michael A. Kelly V.F.W. Hall for \$12.50 per night for every Monday night.

The new Council By-Laws were read and accepted with minor changes. They must now be forwarded to the State Council for approval.

The highlights of the State Convention activities were noted by Grand Knight Howard Leary. Of particular interest was the fact that of the 140 Councils in the State, only 14 received the Star Council Award and Union was among the select group.

It was announced by Weldon Arner that we had received our Council banner, and it will be carried in the Sesquicentennial Parade on June 14, 1958.

Youth Activities Chairman, Jim Murtha, announced two Savings Bonds had been purchased for awards to two outstanding boys in St. Michael's graduating class.

D.G.K. George Arnold requested the members to pray for Florence Velladares, wife of Financial Secretary, Jim Valladres, who is seriously ill.

Al Dietlein announced the council had six alleys available on Wednesday nights at HyWay Bowl for the summer league.

The nominating committee offered the following slate of officers: G.K. Howard Leary, D.G.K. John Zimmerman, Chancellor, George Arnold, Warden, Thomas Crimmins, Treasurer, Wilbur Donnelly, Advocate, Weldon Arner, Inside Guard, James Cappeto, Outside Guard, Alvin Dietlein, Trustees, Charles Lynch, Joseph Gaynor, and William Darrow. There were no nominations from the floor.

Grand Knights Column

While being involved with the fraternal and social advantages of membership in the Knights of Columbus, there is the tendency to forget the primary circumstance that brought us together. Being Catholic men is the common bond that should be the framework of our religion. In the recently issued Supreme Convention Report (on the convention held this past August), some important points were stressed that we must be aware of in order to continue in the proper road towards the fulfillment of our order's objectives in a Catholic manner.

In part of the message of the Supreme Knight, John W. McDevitt, he said "My brothers, let us manifest more interest in our eternal welfare than Catholics generally are prone to done. Let us weigh the proper position which we ought to take with regard to our immortal future. Let our lives be such that we may persevere to the end. If on the other hand we have been indifferent and apathetic, may we reassess our attitude and so live that we may not be afraid to die." Our Faith guarantees us this privileged commitment. Under the issue of abortion it was reported "The American Bishops have suggested a constitutional amendment protecting all life, both born and preborn, as the most effective measure to deal with this dilemma" — "Indicative of this support your board of directors voted at its June meeting to make a second grant of \$50,000 to the U.S. National Conference of Catholic Bishops ProLife Activities Committee. Abortion is a cancerous iniquity in our society which must be excised to save the social structure from total deterioration. Nor must we succumb to defeatism by the enormity of the task. We cannot permit the fiber of our will to yield to the callousness of a secular conscience whose only God is human comfort". The last sub-ject matter of great importance on Catholic action was the report on religious liberties. "A principal peril to the freedom of those who believe in God is the increasing secularization of society in which only atheists and agnostics feel comfortable, and in which the moral values and standards of believers are either ignored or rejected. The situation has deteriorated to the extent that some present policies and practices of government actually constitute an establishment of secularism as a national religion, and therefore, violate the First Amendment of the Constitution which forbids a favored or established religion. We are confident that you will concur that if this order is to remain true to its ideals of working for God and country, it must be ever ready to challenge those who would exclude God from the affairs of this nation".

Msgr. Rosage wrote — "One aspect of the spiritual renewal is the upsurge of interest in all forms of prayer. We are no longer satisfied in merely 'saying prayers' but are turning to higher forms of contemplative prayer. For a long time we thought of contemplative prayer as the special prerogative of mystics. We excused ourselves from this form of prayer as impossible for us.

However the Holy Spirit through the Vatican Council and elsewhere has insisted that all are called to holiness and this means a deeper union with God through love which is prayer. The Fifth Chapter of the Constitution of the Church issued by Vatican II says, 'The Lord Jesus, the divine Teacher and model of all perfection, preached holiness of life to each and everyone of His disciples of every condition. He himself stands as the author of this holiness of life: 'Be you therefore per-fect, even as your heavenly Father is perfect!' Indeed Jesus sent the Holy Spirit upon all that He might move them inwardly to love God with their whole heart and their whole souls, with all their mind and strength and that they might love each other as Christ loves them.

"Genuine prayer is loving. As we come to God in prayer, especially contemplative prayer we learn to love more deeply."


First Friday in January was a moving, loving experience in spite of wind, ice, snow and cold.
