

Chaplain's Corner

Christmas means many things to many people. To us it should mean — Jesus Christ is Lord —

- 1. The name Jesus means "God is saving". Here we tie in all of salvation history, which finds its climax in the Incarnation Mystery (Christmas God becomes man) and the Paschal Mystery (Easter Jesus dies on the cross and arises from the dead for us.) God saves man and man must cooperate to be part of that saving action. Books have been written about salvation history, but words to remember are "believe" and "repent". In prayer it means that I must include the words, "I am sorry" and "Jesus must increase and I must decrease".
- 2. This sets the stage for the meaning of Christ "The anointed one". Scripture tells us how Jesus Christ was led by the Holy Spirit and gives us His first gift The Holy Spirit. As His followers, led by the Holy Spirit, cooperating with the Holy Spirit we say yes to God everyday of our life we imitate the Blessed Virgin Mary's "Let it be done to me according to Thy will". This means that we are willing to listen and to adjust as God requires.

3. Once we think and pray about Jesus Christ we know what the Lord means. Lord means "Kingdom". In Christ God, the Father, establishing the pilgrim people of God, builds the Body of Christ — the Catholic Church. Here our use of the Christ — builders — the Sacraments play a key role. Through the sacraments, daily prayer, and reflection we become serving lovers of God's people, as they are, warts and all.

These are the thoughts, the meaning of Christmas — Easy to read, tougher to live. May you all at this time and through the New Year — learn and practice the meaning of Jesus Christ is Lord in your daily lives.



REPORT OF WASHINGTON D. C. TRIP

The J.F.K. 4th Degree trip to Washington D.C. on the 10th and 11th of November was an outstanding success. There were over seventy-five persons who participated including Sir Knight Congressman Matt Rinaldo F.M. 1st N. J. District, A. Morse and his secretary Knight Ray Jobst. The entourage departed from Union Council Home at 7:45 a.m. on the 10th and arrived at the motel in Virginia at 1:00 p.m. Shortly thereafter we started our tour of Washington. Our first stop was the J.F.K. Art

Center for lunch and a look at the beautiful edifice dedicated to President John F. Kennedy. After lunch a tour of the Capitol was in order and we were met by our own special tour guide and taken for a complete tour of the Capitol and its environs. We then returned to the motel for a short rest prior to going to dinner. The Hospitality Room was opened for the Brother Knights and their wives for refreshments prior to the dinner. Dinner was at the Sheraton-Carlton Hotel and was attended by fifty-six of those in attendance. The veal cordon bleau was a repast as only French chefs can prepare. After dinner the buses returned to the motel and the Hospitality Room was again opened until the wee hours of the morning. Singing, dancing and general merriment was the order of the evening. Sir Knight F. N. Thomas Laffey drove down to be with us and arrived to be with us for the remainder of the trip. Sir Knight Bruce Bentz and his lovely wife, Nancy, also drove down Saturday night. On Sunday morning we departed the motel to attend mass at the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington. The lower crypt church was turned over to the J.F.K. Assemblage for a special mass. Sir Knight Matt Rinaldo and Sir Knight Homer Dukes joined us at the steps of the Shrine and let us into the mass. After mass we were conducted on a private tour of the Shrine by the son of our Master Johnathan Morse, a student teacher at Catholic University. We then took a tour of the Franciscan Monastery a few short blocks from the Shrine. The highlight of the trip came with the wreath laying ceremony at the J.F.K. Memorial at Arlington National Cemetery. Ordinarily buses are not permitted in the Cemetery but we were given VIP treatment and were met at the gate by the Superintendent of the Cemetery and our buses were escorted to the J.F.K. Memorial Site. Police cleared the area for our people and the Company Q. Color Corps personnel. The wreath was borne by the F.M. Al Morse, F.N. Tom Laffey, his son Michael Laffey, Secretary Sir Knight Ray Jobst, and Sir Knight Matthew Rinaldo. The eulogy was given by Sir Knight F.N. Tom Laffey with short briefs given by the Master and Sir Knight Matt Rinaldo. Four flowers were plucked from the wreath and after introductory words by Sir Knight David Schardien explaining their meaning, they were borne by the son of the F.N. Tom Laffey to the gravesite of Robert Kennedy. After the most impressive ceremonies we were again given a VIP escort with the buses to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier to view the changing of the guard. After this we began our trip back to Union.

I would be remiss if at this point I did not give some special thanks to certain individuals, who without their assistance we could not have had such a successful weekend. First, to Congressman M. Rinaldo who arranged the VIP treatment wherever we went while in Washington; Sir Knight Dave Schardien who arranged our tours so well and kept the Hospitality Room stacked with goodies; Sir Knight Stan Rucki, Company Commander of the Company Q. Color and all the wives who made coffee Sunday morning to help ease some throbbing heads.

From the reactions of all who attended, we anticipate returning next year for a longer and bigger weekend for all to enjoy.
