COUNCIL MORTGAGE REDUCED TO \$16,000

To a tumultuous ovation Grand Knight J. Russell Coen announced that through the combined efforts of the Council, Columbian Club, and Swim Club that \$10,000 will be applied to the present mortgage reducing the outstanding balance to about \$16,000.

The significance of this may be seen when we realize that the Council has a net worth of approximately \$250,000. In applying this latest amount toward reduction of mortgage Grand Knight Coen said: "It gives me great pleasure to follow in the footsteps of Past Grand Knights who through almost superhuman effort have been able to reduce our mortgage to a manageable level."

"The goal of 'free and clear' that haunts every home-owner is now within the grasp of Union Council," stated P.G.K. Bill Taylor. This was seconded by P.G.K. Walt Wasowski who said: "... in 1970 we should realize the fruition of the work of all, including the dues paying member, that is, our own Council — truly our own Council."

ANNUAL BALL

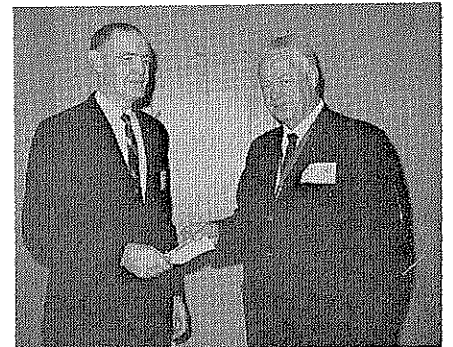

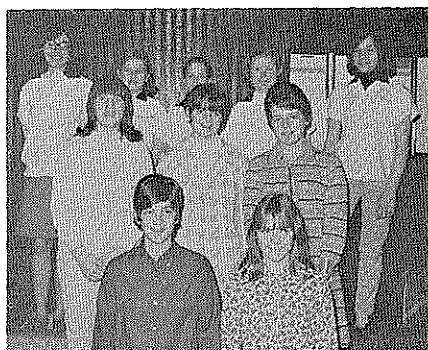

SISTER LUKE, C.S.J.B.

(formerly Dorothy R. McSweeney)



The story of Sister Luke is that of a modern day "Cinderella Sister" . . . from literal rags to spiritual riches. She was born in Elizabeth, New Jersey during the height of those "Depression Years" and because of the unusually difficult struggles involved for young families, was placed with the New Jersey State Board of Child Welfare as a ward of the State when 4 years old. Foster-parents in Springfield opened home and heart which provided not only shelter and necessities, but an unusually happy childhood. Unavoidable incidents made a re-location necessary while attending high school but even this proved a blessing in providing experience of other cultural environments by living with different families. Eventually she graduated from Union High School in 1950.

During early adulthood, Church occupied an important place in her life — an active member of Connecticut Farms Presbyterian Church (which she dearly loves to this day!). She began working at The Howard Savings Institution as a file clerk and in a short time was recognized as a person who could not be happy dealing with "things" but only with "people". For 10 years she enjoyed both the pleasures and responsibilities of the "Career Girl".

While at a picnic, Sister Luke met a Priest and the conversation enthusiastically turned to Christianity. A new dimension gradually opened and she was received into the Roman Catholic Church on Christmas Eve a year later. At that time of deep happiness the thought of dedication

through the Sisterhood rang clear and strong — as it does in most single women converts — and Father suggested she wait and be "sure". When the desire again emerged, 5 years later, it was dismissed as repulsive to her "spirit of independence" — yet, she was uselessly kicking against the goad (as most do) because two years later she knew positively God's desire and her own was to enter the community of The Sisters of Saint John the Baptist. The supreme happiness experienced at conversion was again hers in coming to Him even more intimately.

As all Religious, Sister Luke went through her Religious training. She graduated from Alphonsus College and began teaching in the third grade. While teaching she volunteered for the foreign missions and was accepted to work in Chile, South America.

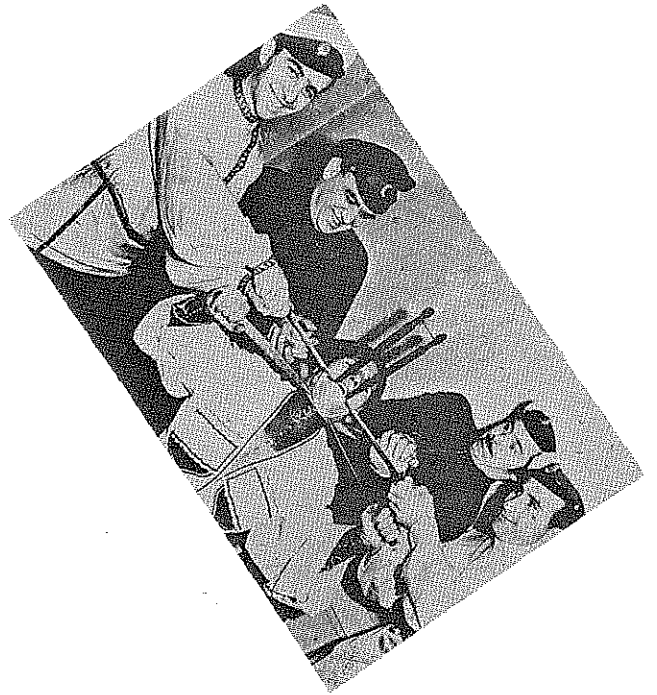
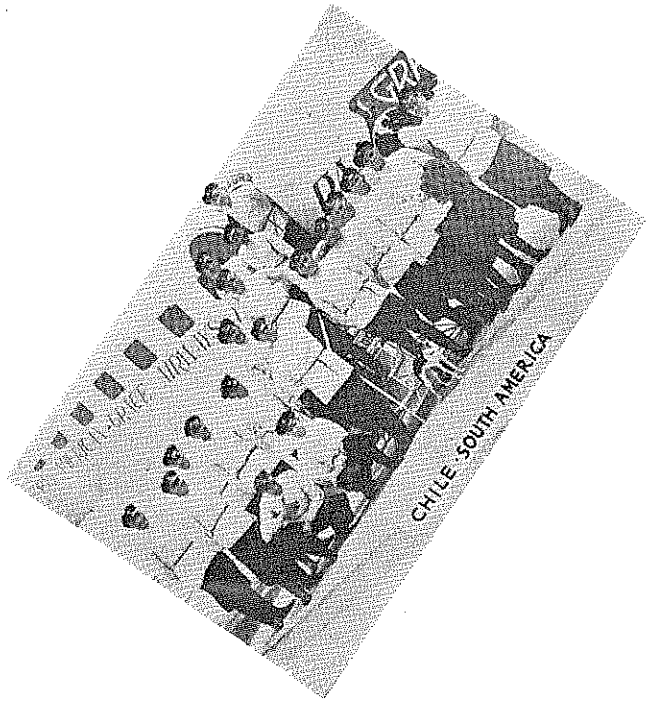
For the past three and a half years she has been in Chile and has seen Christ at work through both Protestant and Catholic Missionaries, Papal Volunteers, Peace Corps, and private families. She has embraced Christ in persons crusted over by disease, poverty and ignorance and found them "pure of heart"; she has seen Him become a reality in the lives of those thirsting for education; she has cried at the unnecessary suffering even Christ abhors in starvation, infant deaths and a "hopeless" tomorrow for so many . . . and she looks ahead to the eventual South American crisis of choosing Christianity or Communism.

It is for these reasons that she is now studying Nursing at Seton Hall

University — to be of more value to the missions as a Sister-nurse. She said: "It must be very evident from my life that I need my fellow man in order to fulfill those vows of Poverty (my "Union" is God and my "Rights" human), Chastity (freedom to love where it is needed) and Obedience (committed to peoples' service). In case you ever wonder what good is accomplished, may my life serve as a reminder that those high taxes are not only contributing to peace through bullets and bombs but also to peace through welfare children who carry within them the Black and White Christ of tomorrow . . . that Churches and people of all faiths bear seeds of Truth and Beauty which visions this world not as an unavoidable hell but rather a supreme giving of life and beauty. Grace is not an intangible "something" — it is brought to us very concretely through human beings at every hour and in every circumstance — this is Catholic because it is universal Love."

Sister Luke wanted to thank all for the share they continually play in helping her to help others — especially The Knights of Columbus who are sponsoring the Don Cossack Chorus at Union High School on March 31 — some of which proceeds will go to Sister Luke. She believes President Kauda of Zambia, South Africa voiced her feelings and spirituality in saying:

"By Christian humanism, I mean we discover all that is worth knowing about God through our fellow men, and unconditional service of our fellow men is the purest form of the service of God."

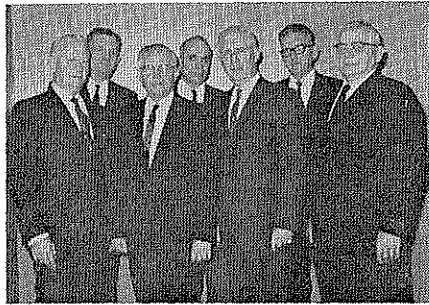

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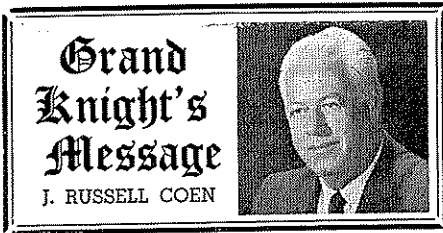

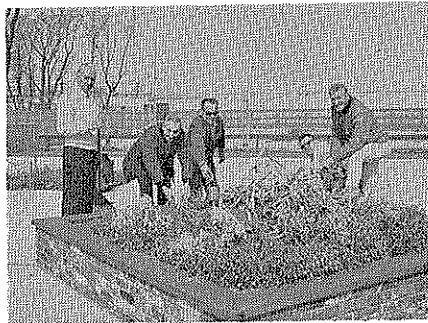

SWIM CLUB NEWS

The Columbian Swim Club is in the throes of re-organizing the committee chairmanships and firming up the plans for the 1968 Swim Club Season which will commence on May 30, 1968. Mr. William Stuart, President of the Board of Governors, Columbian Swim Club has announced that the annual membership fee will remain at \$65.00 for the 1968 season. It is a tribute to the sound financial management of the Swim Club and the participation by the members in the "Volunteer Work Parties", that in spite of rising costs the annual dues remain unchanged.

Since its conception the Swim Club has been co-operative in nature. The idea that a group of people with common interests could band together to share the burden of financing and maintaining the Club's facilities for the benefit of all. In order to keep the cost of maintenance and in some cases capital improvements at a minimum, the "Volunteer Work Party" was instituted. A case in point was the construction of the toilet facilities in the picnic area. By performing the construction with part contract labor and part volunteer workers, a saving of approximately \$5,000.00 was realized for all the members.
