

State Deputy Meeting

Supreme Knight Virgil C. Dechart held the annual meeting of State Deputies at the birthplace of the K. of C. An open air mass was offered at the grave of Father Michael J. McGivney. Bishop Greco said the mass would serve as the initial event in a new four year program to create an awareness in all members, that the Order's centennial will be commemorated during the 100th annual meeting of the Supreme Council in Hartford, Connecticut in 1982. The Supreme Knight stressed that all the state deputies and the membership should understand the basic elements of the Knight's structure. Many activities, projects and programs are carried on by the Knights, he noted, but not all have the same priority. Five basic pillars hold up the structure of the order. These are membership, insurance, councils, ceremonials, and catholicity. Dechart said the importance of membership should be self-evident. Without members there cannot be a society. Membership growth is essential, he pointed out, because an organization which stops growing starts dying.
The Supreme Knight said that the

insurance program, with its \$4.2 billion in force today, provides the financial muscle which make the order a strong and healthy organization. He added that the bulk of the promotion cost for many religious, charitable, patriotic, and civic programs are paid for through the surplus arising from prudent investment of the insurance assets.

Dechart related that councils are essential because it is only through local councils that the order gains members. He said that councils generate the activities and programs which give life to Columbian ideals. It is also in councils that fraternalism is experienced and exercized, and where new leadership is trained and tested. The value of the ceremonials stems from the fact that they express in dramatic form the order's religious ideals and values. The Supreme Knight described Catholicity as the glue that bonds together all the other essential features of the order's structure. Pointing to the Supreme Office Building he said that catholicity serves the same function in the order as does the center concrete shaft of the Supreme Office. He noted that the four visible towers of the building are tied into the central shaft by steel girders rendering it the unseen but pivotal element in the skyscraper. Just as the Supreme Office Building would collapse without the support of the
