

Needed — Transplant

You are born with two kidneys, each about the size of your fist. They perform the life-saving function essential to your body — filtering all impurities from your blood.

Unbelievable as it may seem, you can lead a normal life with only a small portion of each kidney functioning. However, when even that small amount of function ceases, there are only two methods in which your life can be saved. The first method used is the Dialysis machine, which filters your blood in place of your kidneys. This treatment lasts about four to five hours and is done three times a week for the rest of your life.

One of the greatest medical break-throughs — kidney transplants — is the second method of saving a kidney patient's life. If a patient is lucky enough to have a relative with a matching kidney, this kidney is used as a transplant, usually with a great deal of success. If a matching kidney is not available from a relative, then you have to wait for a "donor" kidney. Fortunately, there are a great number of people becoming aware of this problem and more people are donating their kidneys after death. This is done by signing and carrying a donor's card.

Twenty-one thousand people, in New
Jersey, are now on kidney machines
waiting transplants. Only we can help
by carrying donor cards. Donor cards
are available at the Council. Pick up one
from the Chaplain or Officers.

Resolve to be **graceful** enough to confess your sins and forsake them.


Resolve to have **faith** enough to make

Memories

Some notes gleaned from the first recorded minutes of Union Council, dated Nov. 25, 1957: Anyone interested in bowling was invited to contact Al Dietlein, as plans for this sport were already in the making. It was agreed to purchase 300 Christmas posters depicting the Child Jesus in the arms of Mary and bearing the inscription "Keep Christ in Christmas". The posters were to be displayed in the windows of homes and stores as soon as received.

It was agreed to purchase an addressograph for the Recorder.

December 2, 1957 was declared the official date of the organization of Union Council #4504. Recorder Tom Crimmins made the following notation in the minutes: Please God let it grow and prosper. This was followed by noting the names and addresses of the seventeen members of Father Canty Council. Hillside, who were permitted to transfer to Union Council for organization purposes. The names of those members are as follows: George A. Arnold, Edward J. Brennan, James J. Cappeto, D.D.S., James J. Connell, Thomas M. Crimmins. William T. Conry, William S. Darrow, Alvin A. Dietlein, Joseph W. Gaynor, Victor J. Gorman, Howard R. Leary, Charles L. Lynch, Edward M. Mayer, D.D.S., Thomas W. McCann, Andrew J. McCarrick, James A. Mahon, Edward J. Olswelski.

Most of the other Brothers recruited for Father Canty Council by Jim Connell and the rest of his twelve Apostles for the express purpose of staffing a new council in Union, transferred at a later date. The State Council had decreed that it would have been grossly unjust to permit a mass exodus of some fifty members from Hillside.

Is there any doubt in anyone's mind that Tom Crimmins' prayer was answered?
