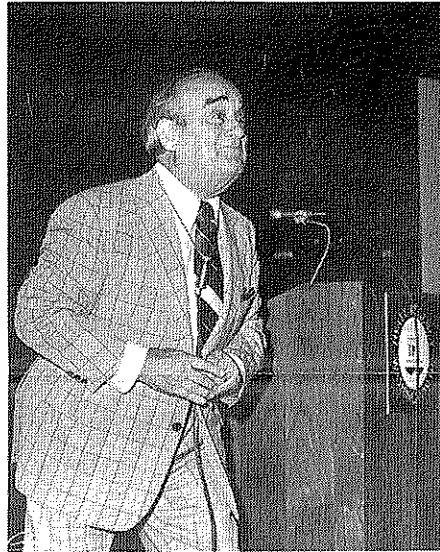
Notice

Dear teenagers,

Memories

The November 10, 1958 meeting was opened by a prayer led by D.G.K. John Zimmerman followed by the opening ode sung by the membership and led by choir master Bob Drew and organist Vince Squazzo.

The trustees submitted a budget of \$718.75 having performed financial surgery on the figures submitted by the six point chairmen which totaled \$1360. The chairmen promptly requested and were granted a review of the cuts.

A resolution was read for the second time and passed to purchase a full page ad in the ad journal in conjunction with the church stage production of "Roberta".

A motion was made to donate \$10.00 to the State Council Servicemen's Committee, followed by a motion to contribute the difference between the "Beggars Bowl" proceeds and \$100.00 and donate the sum of \$100.00 to Frank J. Dickerson who is ill.

A resolution to form a Columbian Club was presented by Advocate Weldon Arner.

Catholic Activities Chairman Warren Hehl thanked the brothers for the fine turn out for our corporate communion held at St. Michael's Church.

Jim Connell reporting for Fraternal Activities chairman Jim Confroy reported that John Arminio is seriously ill, and confined to Orange Memorial Hospital. He requests prayers for his recovery and cards to cheer him up. Jim also stated the committee has 200 "Keep Christ in Christmas" posters on hand.

Council Activities Chairman Bill Donnelly reported we have received our charter and preparations for a celebration of "Charter Night" are under way.

Building Committee Chairman Bill Bauer reported the Committee has received several parcels of land in town and finally recommend a plot on Jeannette Ave. He stated a water problem existed at this site, but a meeting with a civil engineer is scheduled to determine its suitability. He has also advised the Township, the owners of the land, that we are interested in purchasing it.

Safe Driving Chairman Oscar Ernst spoke on safe use of bicycles, a subject of much interest to the fathers present.

Lecturer Joe Milo spoke on the election of a new pope. He also spoke at length on the life of Pope John XXIII and his family. A movie was shown of Pope Pius XII to conclude an interesting program.

Deputy Grand Knight Zimmerman spoke on the resolution to form a Columbian Club and on the problems faced by Brother Knight Frank J. Dickerson since being felled by polio. John closed the meeting by leading the Council in prayer.

Personality Profile Christopher Columbus (Part Seven)

On the second voyage to the new world Columbus was instructed by the king and queen to convert the natives to the catholic faith. This second trip was heavily loaded with supplies, equipment and men. Seventeen ships sailed with all the items aboard for colonizing the new islands. Fifteen hundred men was the total manpower that set sail. The skill and confidence of Columbus increased as he led so many ships and seamen to strange lands. Problems of interfighting and development of new settlements came with deep involvement in the new world. For the first time they discovered indians (the Carbis) who were cannibalistic. At the end of the return trip to Spain, after seven monotonous weeks at sea, all on board were down to a daily ration of six ounces of bread and a pint and a half of water. Columbus went ashore wearing the rough robe of a Franciscan Monk. Always a devout man, he turned to religion more and more as he advanced in age. "After his first voyage Columbus made pilgrimages of Thanksgiving for surviving the winter storms. It is quite likely he made a few personal vows on the second trip, when starvation followed in the wake of his ship."

On his third journey Columbus came upon the coast of South America, the first time any European had done so, but he assumed it was just another island. At about the time of the fourth and last voyage his triumphant discoveries had taken a "back seat" to more urgent matters of state to Spain. Great voyages of discovery were making news often by other men of the times. Vasco de Gama of Portugal to name one. Christopher finally got his fourth trip and was able to take his 13 year old son. At this point in the life of Columbus he was not physically strong, as he had been on previous trips. The years of exposure and hardship had taken their toll. He suffered from arthritis and his vision was failing. His mind was still active and his seamanship superb. The admiral's last voyage was notable for its discovery of a great deal of Central America. On Christopher's final return to Spain his benefactor and supporter through the years, Queen Isabella, was deathly ill. She died on November 26, 1504. By May of 1506 Columbus' health failed rapidly. After making his own hand written will with notaries and servants present as witnesses on May 19, he died the following day, May 20, 1506, Ascension Day. He received Holy Communion and breathed his last saying "Onto thy Hands O Lord I commit my spirit".

In summary, Christopher Columbus was a man of great contrasts. After a hard stretch at sea, when his exhausted crew lay asleep, he would tiptoe around them making adjustments to sails and rigging quietly to let them sleep. Yet he could execute a mutineer without batting an eye. One of the best expressions about Columbus that I liked was from one of his biographers, Samuel E. Morison, who said "no other sailor had the persistence, the knowledge, and the sheer guts to sail thousands of

Holy Shroud of Turin

As a special feature of our Chaplain's First Friday Session on June 2, we will present an illustrated lecture relating to a piece of cloth believed to be the burial shroud of Jesus. This cloth, known as the Shroud of Turin, has been studied extensively by serologists, biologists and archeologists. Through normal physical process an image, both frontal and dorsal of the body which reposed in the shroud, can be seen. The body is that of a man about 35 years of age, with a badly lacerated scalp, who has been scourged, crucified and with his right side pierced after death. The body was in the shroud more than 24 hours and less than 72 hours. Somehow, it separated from the shroud without smearing the image on the cloth.

This very interesting lecture will be given by Mr. Caesar Gili who has been a student of the Holy Shroud of Turin for 20 years. His approach is scientific and in complete accord with the Holy Gospels. He is a specialist on the subject and is able to share with others both his critical eye and deep devotion to Christ. He is approved and recommended by the Holy Shroud Guild.

Mass will be celebrated, as usual, at 8:00 p.m. by our Chaplain Father Ed. There will be a short coffee break and the lecture will follow.

Your Committee went to great pains to secure this interesting and inspiring program and we hope you will demonstrate your appreciation and interest by coming out in large numbers. There is no admission charge and all are welcome.
