

Swim Club Badges

Badges for the 1972 season will be available to the membership at the work parties, Saturday May 13 and 20 between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon and before and after the Council meeting on Monday, May 22 for those who wish to pick them up prior to the opening of the pool. Thereafter, they will be available at the gate house during pool hours. Please be prepared to show a paid-up traveling card when applying for your badges. If your dues are not paid up to date you will not be given your badges. Please do not embarass us or yourself by failing to adhere to this rule. If some member of the family, other than the member himself, wishes to pick up the badges, please have the member's paid up traveling card with you. The fact that you may be a well know person has no bearing on the adherance to this requirement. Please do not request or expect your brother Knight to break a rule for you.


This year all children under 12 years of age will be issued a white badge with a red stripe and red lettering on it. It is octagon shaped like a stop sign. Any child wearing this type badge will not be allowed to swim beyond the rope separating the shallow end or 3 ft.water from the deep or 5 ft. water, nor will he be permitted to use the diving boards or diving tank until he has passed the deep water test administered by the life guards or instructors. Having passed the deep water test, we will exchange the red badge for a yellow one with the same number as the one being replaced. The swimmer's name will also be re-corded on our records and he will not be required to take the test in future

We believe this system will assist the guards and the manager of the pool to readily ascertain who is permitted in the deep water and to qucikly spot a child who is not qualified to be in said area. It will also eliminate the elastic bands that were used previously, but which were difficult to see in many cases.

Please do not embarass the manager, the guards or yourself by bringing a child who is not qualified into the deep water or the diving area. You may be a parent and an excellent swimmer but you are not paid to be a life guard. Avoid these situations by having your child qualify early in the season or if he cannot swim enroll him in a swimming class.

A safe summer will be a happer summer. One can enjoy the pool facilities as much by comporting himself within the bounds of our simples rules and regulations as he can be breaking them, and those around him will enjoy the pool more also. Let's enjoy the pool, grounds and each other by being thoughtful, courteous, friendly and cooperative.

"The Drug Scene"

BARBITURATES

The misuse of barbiturates — alias "Goof Balls", "Sleepers", "Downers", or "Barbs", has become one of the biggest problems among our youth today. They can be very harmful if used improperly but are very valuable when used for legitimate and medical pruposes. They belong to a large family of drugs manufactured for the medical purpose of relaxing the central nervous system. In medical practice, barbiturates are used to treat insommia, anxiety, nervous tension and epilepsy.

Barbiturates can be classified into two categories - the short-acting, fast starting or the long acting, slow starting. Of these the short-acting are the ones most commonly abused. They appear in a variety of colored capsules or tablets. Because of their colors they are known on the street and in groups as "Red Devils", "Yellow Jackets", "Rain-

bows" or "Blue Angles"

Barbiturates are usually taken orally. However habitual users and addicts have been known to dissolve the compounds and inject them into their body. Sometimes they are taken with alcohol, and sometimes with benzedrine and dexedrine. This is especially dangerous because the depressant action of the one multiplies the depressant action of the other. A consumption of even a small amount of this mixture may result in death.

The organ in your body most sensitive to barbiturates is the brain. They depress brain functions, and in larger doses depresses the brains center which is responsible for maintaining the rythm of respiration.

A barbiturate user may react to the drug more strongly at one time then

at another. The extend of the effect the drug has upon an individual depends upon the dose taken, the person who takes it, and the setting in which it is taken. Normally small amounts make the user relaxed, sociable, and good humored. But in larger doses the effects resemble drunkeness. His speech becomes slurred, he becomes confused, quarrelsome, and starts to stagger. His ability to think, to concentrate and to work becomes impaired.

A person who is under the influence of barbiturates acts like someone who is intoxicated. He is likely to stumble and drop things, he is often bruised, and he may have cigarette burns on his body. A marked regression in behavior is a sign of barbiturate abuse, such as neglecting himself and his living quarters.

Barbiturates are addicting because the body needs increasingly higher doses to feel their effects. Some doctors consider barbiturate addiction more difficult to cure than narcotic addiction. Those addicted to barbiturates must have them to prevent going into withdrawal. If the drug is withdrawn suddenly the user will suffer withdrawal sickness with severe cramps, nausea, delerium, convulsions and sudden death. Therefore, withdrawal should take place in a hospital over a period of several weeks on a gradually reduced dosage. This will allow the body to return to normal.

The law is very strict regarding drugs under the "Comprehensive Drug Abuse Prevention and Control Act of 1970". There are strong penalities for illegal possession and distribution of barbiturates.

Swim Club Opens May 27th

The Columbian Swim Club is rapidly completing the necessary pre-season planning and work to make the pool and all facilities ready for opening day on May 27, 1972.

The pool manager for the 1972 Swim Club season is Guards Unlimited, Inc., from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The volunteer work parties are completing the necessary maintenance to get the pool ready for opening. The work parties convene at 9 a.m. on Saturday and at 6 p.m. on Wednesday. These work parties will continue until opening day. After the pool opens, work parties will be announced and posted on the bulletin board. All work party passes of 1972 will be valid for the next season, a new ruling approved by your Board of Directors.

The pool will open on May 27th, 28th, and 29th, 1972, and it will also be opened the weekend of June 3rd and 10th. The pool will be opened continuously, from June 17th through September 4th, 1972.

A paid-up Knights of Columbus traveling card must be presented in order to pick up your membership badges. All Swim Club members are requested to review the rules and regulations governing the membership in the Columbian Swim Club. All rules within the pool area will be strictly enforced.

There will be a mass held at 11, on May 27, 1972 by Father Edward at the poolside. Activities for the 1972 season will be posted as soon as possible.


