

On April 25th, 1966 Rev. Victor R. Yanitelli, S.J., President of Saint Peter's College, Jersey City will address the members of Union Council #4504, Knights of Columbus after their regular meeting. His topic will be Higher Education.
Father Yanitelli was schooled at

Fordham Prep and Fordham College. He entered the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) in September 1933. He received his B.A. degree from Georgetown, Magna cum laude, in 1940, M.A. from Fordham in 1942, Ph.D. in Romance Languages from Fordham in 1945. In 1948 he was ordained at Woodstock College, Woodstock, Maryland. In 1949 and 1950 he continued his studies in Florence, Italy.

Father Yanitelli taught at Fordham Prep from 1940 to 1943. From 1946 through 1948 he taught English, Spanish and Philosophy at the University of Scranton. Returning to Fordham College in 1950 he taught French, Italian, and Italian Literature in the Undergraduate and Graduate schools.

In 1953 he also assumed the duties of Director of Student personnel at Fordham University. In 1958 he was elevated to position of Vice President of Fordham in charge of Student Personnel.

In 1963 Father Yanitelli was transferred to Saint Peter's College where he became Director of Student Personnel Services.

In 1965 he was elevated to the position of President of Saint Peter's College.

Presentation of Mariner's Award to Chief Harold Denk

On Monday evening, March 28th, the Union Council #4504, Knights of Columbus will bestow the Mariner's Award on Fire Chief Harold Denk after their regular business meeting.

A copy of the resolution that accompanies the award states that Chief Denk has been chosen to be the recipient of this award because, "Harold Denk has served for 39 years as a member of the Union Township Fire Department, the last 17 of them as Chief Engineer; these years of service have been marked by dedication to the common good of all the residents of this community and by tireless and conscientious devotion to his oath of office and by extraordinary performance of his duties."

Chief Denk was appointed to the paid department on May 2, 1927. In less than one year he was promoted to the rank of Master Mechanic on April 1st, 1928. On December 29, 1930 he assumed the rank of Captain and on April 15, 1933 he was named Deputy Chief. He became Chief Engineer of the department on January 1, 1949 after the death of Chief Walter Bond.

Denk and his wife of 32 years, the former Miss Marian Olson of Union, live at 1065 Overlook Terrace. They are the parents of two sons, Ronald, a United Airlines pilot, and Douglass, a crew chief with Mohaw Airlines.

Chief Denk belongs to many of the national, state, and local fire officials' associations.

When Chief Denk joined the paid department he comprised one-third of it. The organization that he now heads numbers almost 100 members.

Grand Knight B. Warren Hehl has extended an invitation for the many friends of the Chief to be present at the Council Home at 1034 Jeanette Ave. on the occasion of the presentation. The presentation will be made at 9:30 P.M.

Mr. Andrew Hatcher

On Monday evening, March 28, 1966 Mr. Andrew Hatcher, a nationally known personality, will be the guest speaker at Union Council #4504, Knights of Columbus at the Council Home at 1034 Jeanette Ave. The talk will follow the presentation of the Mariner's Award to Fire Chief Harold Denk and the regular meeting.

Mr. Hatcher achieved widespread prominence when he was appointed Associate White House Press Secretary to President John F. Kennedy two days after the President's election in 1960. He retained this position with President Lyndon B. Johnson

until April, 1964.

A one time newspaper man, he was editor of the Sun Reporter, a San Francisco weekly, in 1947-50. He has also served as Assistant Labor Commissioner of the State of California. At the present time he is Market Promotions Manager of P. Ballantine & Sons, Newark, New Jersey.

His topic for the evening is "The President's Press Relations."

Down Mexico Way

The Mexican legislature is moving to tighten up existing laws which now govern the content of mass communication media output. Proposed legislation would limit and punish anything that violates "decency and proper habits."

Mexican laws are reported to be already much more stringent than their U. S. counterparts, but legislators are becoming disturbed by an increasing trend toward outright pornography in magazines and TV shows.

A United States product, "Playboy" magazine, is reported to be specifically banned from sale in Mexico and other foreign magazines with photos of nudes removed from newsstands should they get by the customs officials.

PUBLIC DECENCY

"Most retail druggists throughout the United States are becoming as concerned with the possible contamination of literature which they handle as they are with the contents of drugs and other products dispensed to their patrons." This was the view expressed by national Citizens For Decent Literature leaders last month after a review of programs launched last year by two of the nation's leading drug store chains, the Rexall and Walgreen Drug Companies.

The Rexall program began early last year with the distribution of a memo to all State Rexall Club Officers from Mr. Harry Powell, President of the International Association of Rexall Clubs. Mr. Powell expressed his concern over the indecent and obscene literature which appears on newsstands and he mentioned that he had an extended discussion on the subject with the Governor of one state who shared this concern. Out of that discussion came the idea that perhaps we, as independent businessmen with a real interest in our communities, might be in a position to make a significant contribution in this regard."

Mr. Bowles, who is President of the Rexall Drug Products Division said that the company's policy of outlawing pornographic literature had met with widespread approbation and store owners had been able to overcome movements by magazine distributors to force acceptance of obscene magazines along with wholesome ones. "Store owners who've held their ground have overcome the problem," Mr. Bowles said.

Most of the cooperating Rexall

Most of the cooperating Rexall Druggists have posted signs at their newsstands reading: "If you find objectionable magazines on our news rack, please notify us and they will be removed."

Meanwhile, during the same year, officials of the Walgreen Drug chain took steps to reemphasize a policy that, according to Mr. C. W. Mulaney, Vice President, had been in effect for years: "Best-seller or not, an indecent publication will not be offered for sale by Walgreen Drug stores."

"This has been a Walgreen policy for many years, but we are being more assertive about it now, in view of the state of today's market," Mr. Mulaney stated. "More than a million shoppers come into our stores every day, and a large number of them are young people. As members of the communities we serve, we feel responsible for the kind of literature we offer."
