"Mothers Find Christ and Glory in Making a Home"



Dear Friend,

How are you? I just had to send you this letter to tell you how much I love and care about you. I saw you yesterday as you were walking with your friends. I waited all day, hoping you would talk to Me also. As evening drew near, I gave you a beautiful sunset to close your day and a cool breeze to rest you, and I waited. You never came. Oh, yes, it hurt me, but I still love you because I'm your friend. I saw you fall asleep last night, and I longed to touch your brow, so I spilled moonlight upon your pillow and face. Again I waited, wanting to rush down so we could talk. I have so many gifts for you. Upon awakening, you were late for your day and rushed off. My tears were in the rain. Today you looked so sad, so alone. It makes my heart ache because I understand. My friends let me down and hurt me many times too, but I love you. I try to tell you in the quiet green grass; I whisper it in the leaves and trees, breathe it in the colors of the flowers. I shout it to you in the mountain streams, and give the birds love songs to sing. I clothe you with warm sunshine and perfume the air. My love for you is bigger than the biggest wants or needs you have; deeper than the oceans. We will spend eternity together in heaven if you really want Me. I know how hard it is on this earth. I really know (because I was there) and I want to help you. My father wants to help you, too. He's that way, you know. Just call me, ask me, talk to me, accept Me. It is your decision. I have chosen you, and because of this, I will wait for you to choose me. Because I love, I love, I love you.

1. A young priest was explaining the Catechism to the first graders. He used our Lord's words: "Rejoice because your reward is great in heaven." And then he asked: "Now, let's see if anyone knows the answer: When we get to heaven who will get the biggest crown?" A deep silence filled the classroom. Little minds were grinding through the labor of thinking. Then suddenly little Jimmy shot up his hand and answered: "I know who'll get the biggest crown — my mother!"

Not so bad, thought the priest: for a mother has got the biggest crown in heaven, and all mothers can obtain a great reward in heaven by finding Christ in the making of a home.

2. Let's always remember that whatever we do for another in Christ's name we do for Christ. "I assure you," said our Lord, "as often as you did it for one of my least brothers, you did it for me." (Matt. 26-40). The very vocation of a mother finds her doing things for her husband and children constantly and continuously, and she is thus finding Christ and doing things for Christ in the home she makes.

Time magazine many years ago published some interesting statistics about the activities of a mother in her home—in twenty years of family life, the average mother will kiss the members of her family 45,000 times; mothers will butter 175,000 pieces of bread, and peel 87,000 potatoes. Within those twenty years she will darn 10,400 socks and stockings, and make 29,200 beds.

3. Have you ever sat down and added up all that you owe to your mother? Begin at the time you were a little baby and think of all she did for you ever since then. She nursed you hour after hour; she often got up at night to care for you; no matter how cross you were, she tried to be patient as an angel with you. As you grew older, she taught you how to walk and talk, taught you how to think and pray, and lisp the name of Jesus and Mary. In your time, you have been a great deal of trouble to your mother, but she has borne all cheerfully for you and for our Lord. Many a time she has gone without things herself that you might have what you wanted. She and your father have worked hard that you might have an education and be fitted to make your way through life. Perhaps your mother looks plain and old-fashioned now; perhaps she is faded and worn. But what caused this? Was it not that she used up her best years, her best energy caring for you. We will never know how much mother has borne for us and for our Lord!

4. But let us see how a Christian mother finds Christ in making her home. In accepting and loving the children that

God sends her, a mother gains glory by giving glory to Christ. For she thus shares in the creative power of God; and by her influence, by her advice and her example, she helps Christ carry on the great work of His Redemption. Again, her motherhood gives her joy by giving joy to Christ. For each child strengthens the holy and Christ-like love that binds her and her husband together. She and Christ rejoice together as she sees each child baptized into the very life of our Lord, as she watches with inner satisfaction her boys and girls grow into other Christs. And though maturity separates them from her, she lives to see her children build other Nazareths, or carry on the work of Christ in the priesthood, in the religious life, in His churches and schools.

5. A Christian mother finds Christ in the education of her children. She works to develop habits of piety in her little ones; she arouses their love of God, of Mary, and of all the things of God. She teaches them to think of God and to pray to Him in simple words. A faithful mother teaches Christ by teaching her little ones to deny themselves, to practice self-sacrifice for love of Jesus crucified. She guides them with firmness and love, and corrects any sign of the evil inclinations which we all inherit from our first parents. In her efforts to find Christ, a mother guards her children from those who would destroy their innocence and lead them to sin. And she knows that her every words and act must reflect Christ for them, if she is to make them other Christs.

6. A Christian mother is unbiased in guiding the vocations of her children. She finds Christ in her home by knowing that her children possess the Holy Spirit Who gently leads each one in the path, to the vocation that God grants to each one. A true mother tries to find out the God-given vocations of her children, and then helps her children cultivate and follow said vocations. Above all, she makes the atmosphere of her home so Christ-like that the children willingly and joyfully embrace the vocation which God sends.

Mary, the mother of Jesus, gave us an example of the perfect mother. She accepted God's will and became the mother of the Savior. She saw in her Child the fullness of divine life and she trained Him perfectly. She never for an instant set her own mind and heart as an obstacle to His vocation. She most closely cooperated with her Son in His work, our Redemption. She entered most intimately into all the sorrow and pain of the Sacrifice of the Cross.

Let Mary be the model of mothers. Mothers have a grand opportunity of gaining a magnificent crown in heaven.

Christian Training of Youth and the Catholic School — Part II

1. The Popes of the modern era have spoken about the importance of Christian education for our children. We will quote briefly from Pope Leo XIII and Pope Paul VI, and give excerpts from the short discourse recently addressed to the educators in our Catholic school by Pope John Paul II, now gloriously reigning.

Pope Leo XIII wrote about the importance of religious training as follows: "It is of the highest importance that the offspring of Christian marriage should be thoroughly grounded in the precepts of religion and that various studies by which youth is fitted for the world should be joined with those of religion. To divorce these is to make youth indifferent to its duties to God; a system of education in itself fallacious and particularly so in tender years; for it opens the door to atheism and closes it on religion. Christian parents must therefore be careful that their children receive instruction in religion as soon as they are capable of understanding it; and that nothing may, in the schools thereafter, blemish their faith or their morals."

Pope Paul VI, who was very close to the Knights of Columbus, shortly before he died, addressed these words to the Knights: "Christ needs you, Christ needs you," said, of the Catholic school, in brief words: "We understand what an arduous and delicate task it is today to conduct a Catholic school, but we are convinced that the cause deserves to be supported with persevering dedication and sacrifice."

2. Shortly after our Holy Father, Pope John Paul II, now gloriously reigning, ascended the Chair of Peter, he addressed a message to the National Catholic Educational Association of the United States, then gathering for its annual meeting, and, through the association, to all the Catholic schools, students and teachers and to all those generously committed to Catholic education.

Our Holy Father said: "Among the many reflections that could be made at this time there are three points in particular to which I would like to make a brief reference at the beginning of my pontificate. These are: **the value of Catholic schools, the importance of Catholic teachers and educators, and the nature of Catholic education itself.** These are themes that have been developed at length by my predecessors. At this time, however, it is important that I add my own testimony to theirs, in the special hope of giving a **new impulse to Catholic education.**"

3. "With profound conviction I ratify and reaffirm the words that Paul VI spoke originally to the Bishops of your country: 'Brethren, we know the difficulties involved in preserving Catholic schools, and the uncertainties of the future, and yet we rely on the help of God and on your own zealous collaboration and untiring efforts, so that Catholic schools can continue, despite grave obstacles, to fulfill their providential role at the service of genuine Catholic education, and at the service of your country.' (Address of September 15, 1975.) **Yes the Catholic school must remain a privileged means of Catholic education in America. As an instrument of the apostolate it is worthy of the greatest sacrifices.**

4. "But no Catholic school can be effective without dedicated Catholic teachers, convinced of the great ideal of Catholic education. The Church needs men and women who are intent on teaching by word and example — intent on helping to permeate the whole educational milieu with the spirit of Christ. **This is a great vocation, and the Lord Himself will reward all who serve in it as educators in the cause of the word of God.**

5. "In order that the Catholic school and the Catholic teachers may truly make their irreplaceable contribution to the Church and to the world, the goal of Catholic education itself must be crystal clear. Beloved sons and daughters of the Catholic Church, brothers and sisters in the faith, **Catholic education is above all a question of communicating Christ, of helping to form Christ in the lives of others, etc.**

"These are indeed essential aims of the Catholic school, of Catholic education. To foster and promote them gives meaning to the Catholic school; it spells out the dignity of the vocation of Catholic educators . . . **The cause of Catholic education is the cause of Jesus Christ and of His Gospel at the service of man.**"

We conclude from the foregoing that it is important that we keep our Catholic schools open and that our children be given the opportunity to attend them for their earthly and heavenly happiness.

**Chaplain's
Corner**

Some thoughts about the Resurrection of Jesus which I would like to share with you. There are always those who doubt and those who try to explain away the Resurrection. But, to me, one thing is certain — if Jesus had not risen from the dead we would never have heard of him. The women were coming to the tomb to care for a dead body. The apostles and disciples were huddled together — thinking everything has ended in tragedy. By far the best proof of the Resurrection is the existence of the Catholic Church. Nothing else could have changed sad and despairing people into people radiant with joy and bursting with courage. **The Resurrection is the central fact of our faith.** Because we believe in the Resurrection, certain things follow:

a) **Jesus is not a figure in a book but a living presence.** We may begin by studying the story of Jesus as if he were a great historical figure but we must end by meeting Him personally.

b) **Jesus is not a memory but a presence.** The dearest memory fades. The Greeks had a word to describe "time" meaning "time which wipes all things out." Long since, time would have wiped out the memory of Jesus unless He is a living presence to us. Jesus is not someone to discuss so much as someone to meet.

c) **Our Catholic life is not the life of one who knows about Jesus but the life of one who knows Jesus.** There is a great difference between knowing about a person or knowing a person. Most people know about the President of the United States but not so many know him. The greatest scholar in the world who knows everything about Jesus is less than the humblest Catholic who knows Him.

d) **There is an endless quality to our faith.** It should never stand still. Because our Lord is a living Lord, there are new wonders and new truths waiting to be discovered by us.

Thus, our religion is unique. We praise and worship not a dead hero or abstract principle but we worship and praise a living person — Jesus who is divine and human. He is or should be the center of our life and all else should flow from Him.

We cannot love ourself properly and our neighbor unless we love God. We can't do any good unless we love God and for us the great consolation and challenge — Jesus lives and loves each one of us.

K of C Opposes F.C.C.

The Board of Directors of the Supreme Council went on record as opposing a Federal Communications Commission proposal to deregulate radio broadcasting. It was pointed out that the net effect of the F.C.C. deregulation program would be to deny protection of the public interest. Currently radio stations are required to serve in the "public interest, convenience and necessity". Under deregulation, radio stations no longer would be required to allot a minimum amount of time to non-commercial programming such as news, public affairs or religion. The station no longer would have to limit the number of commercials. License renewals would be given without the process of ascertaining whether the station serves the community needs. This means the station would have to be concerned only with securing a sufficiently large audience to sell enough commercials during your programs, they will increase under the F.C.C. plan. Those who disagree with this proposal should express their opinion to: Secretary, Federal Communications Commission, 1919 M Street N.W., Washington D.C. 20554. The proper designation of the case is "Notice of proposed rule-making for the deregulation of radio, BD Docket No. 79-219."

**Death to "Useless" Life!
Euthanasia Now**

If you have any personal doubts — or are ever challenged — as to where abortion is leading us, remember Dr. Christian Barnard, the South African heart transplant surgeon.

At a recent meeting in Washington, D.C., he said the time has come for doctors to practice "active euthanasia" on hopelessly ill patients. When his ethics were called in question, he replied:

"You have already agreed to destroy a life, (through abortion) the quality of which you don't even know, yet you say you can't act to destroy a life, the quality of which you know has disappeared."

His logic is flawless, his phrasing trenchant. His statement leaves no room to doubt where we are heading.

To accept death as a solution at life's beginning will inevitably result in its acceptance as a solution for disposing of other "unwanted" or "useless" groups at other stages of life.
