The committee for the University of Notre Dame Glee Club concert held it's first meeting on Friday evening, October 17th at the Council home.

As previously announced, this outstanding cultural event will be held on Monday evening, February 2nd, 1970 at Union High School.

The committee under Chairman Walter Wasowski P.G.K. decided to have an advance distribution of tickets to the council membership prior to the public sale. This will enable Union Council members to obtain tickets for themselves, friends and relatives.

To many people, the mention of The University of Notre Dame brings to mind outstanding football teams, but to thousands of others who have heard the performances of The Notre Dame Glee Club, it is the "Voice of the Fighting Irish" which they think of.

The Club, which was organized in 1915 by twelve students who were the originators of the group's informal songfest tradition, has traveled from Maine to California and performed on the concert stage, radio

and television. Critics have consistently given the Club excellent ratings based on choral technique, interpretation, varied repertoire and showmanship. Undoubtedly, The Notre Dame Glee Club is "the top collegiate glee club in the nation.

One of the most important reasons why The Notre Dame Glee Club has acquired such an outstanding reputation is the selection of "traveling members." Each Club member must perform in no less than three tryouts before he is able to appear with the Glee Club. Professor Pedtke appraises each individual voice according to quality of tone, pitch, and volume. The forty-voice "Singing Irish" which will appear in concert are then carefully selected to insure well-balanced vocal blend. Traveling an average of 9,000

miles a year for the last twenty years, The Notre Dame Glee Club has toured the United States extensively and has performed for various functions. Some of the highlights in the Club's history are:

The Club was featured every Easter for several years on the C.B.S. network's "Ed Sullivan Show."

In 1950, before an audience of 20,000 in Chicago Stadium, the Club sang a benefit with movie stars Pat O'Brien and Ann Blyth. The Club entertained its largest concert audience, 85,000 people, in 1953 when it appeared at the Philadelphia Music Festival

More recently, the Club has recorded an album of religious songs for M.G.M. including Antonio Lotti's "Mass in Bb," and three albums of school songs and popular selections. The Glee Club has been featured on several network radio programs and "The Mike Douglas Show" broadcast from Philadelphia.

The biggest highlights (in recent years) were national appearances on "The Andy Williams Show" and the "John Davidson Special."

This year "The Singing Irish" are looking forward to another successful season and have in their reper-toire such songs as "Ave Maria," "Impossible Dream," "The Lost Chord," "With a Song in My Heart,"
"Halls of Ivy" and the traditional fight song with which they close each concert, the "Victory March."







Chaplain's Corner

November is traditionally the month in which Christians especially remember the Holy Souls. Some people think that this is morbid, this constant reference to the dead.
"After all," they say, "death is final.
When a person dies, he dies, and that's it! What good will all the praying in the world do?" Our holy faith teaches differently. During the entire year, and especially so in the month of November, to think of and to pray for the dead is a good thing. If we think of the dead in a reasonable way, not constantly, but occasionally enough, we are but remind-ing ourselves of the destiny of every man: someday, somehow, somewhere, each and every man dies. And for the Christian, this death is not an end to life but a change. The Preface of the Funeral Mass tells us: "life is not ended, but merely changed; and when this earthly abode dissolves, an eternal dwelling place awaits us in heaven." So you see, that, to think of the dead is merely to face reality - the reality of our own death—and to strengthen our faith in life after death. To pray for the dead is a good thing. Holy Scripture in the 2nd Book of Maccabees puts it very simply: "It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins." Our holy faith in one of its chief articles of be-lief reminds us of the "Communion of Saints" — that all-embracing society of God's chosen on earth, in purgatory, and in heaven. We still here on earth ask the saints in heaven to intercede for us, and we also ask God to deliver those souls awaiting heaven. Our love for others extends beyond this life. Let us then, during this month of November, think about, and pray for our beloved dead.
