Grand Knight's Message for August 1994

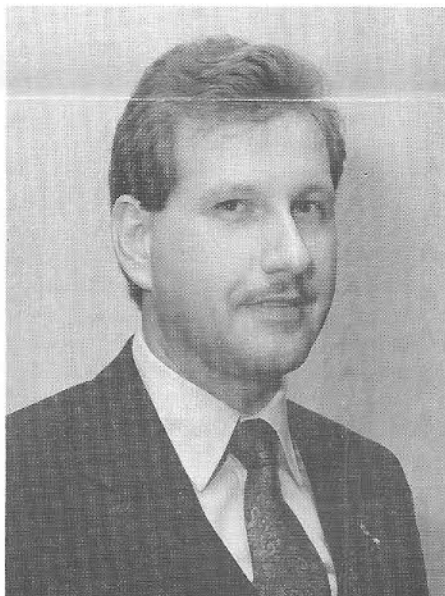
Brothers, there can be no question of the gravity of the social problems facing our society today: poverty, hunger, exploitation of workers, blighted cities, racial difference, disregard for law and the breakdown of public order, and morality. Neither can there be any question that there are some persons, young and old who are alarmed, concerned, and highly indignant that such problems continue to exist in a society which has so much scientific knowledge, technical skill and economic resources at its disposal.

The trouble is that these people are looking in the wrong direction in their search to find polishes to help make this "dusty society" shine again. Not finding the answer they are seeking, they are bewildered, frustrated and angry. They strike out with blind violence at society and its institutions. Some seem to feel that the only way to cure the ills of society is to destroy society itself.

Some men feel that answers to these problems can be found in politics and government, that is by passing more and more laws. Here they are making a tragic and terrible mistake. For most of the problems which afflict human society today are in final analysis moral problems. They result from disorders and imbalances in the minds and hearts of human beings. The unequal distribution of wealth, the exploitation of the worker, racism and disregard for law are basically the consequences of incorrect moral attitudes. Neither politics nor law can get at the root of such problems. A remedy can only be reached through a better understanding between fellow men in society.

Neither government nor science nor philosophy can effectively lead men to unselfish love of their fellow men. However, it is only in such unselfish love that the answer to man's problems concerning society can be found.

The very fact that some people are willing to try to solve these problems proves that our society is not dying even if it may be a little dusty.
