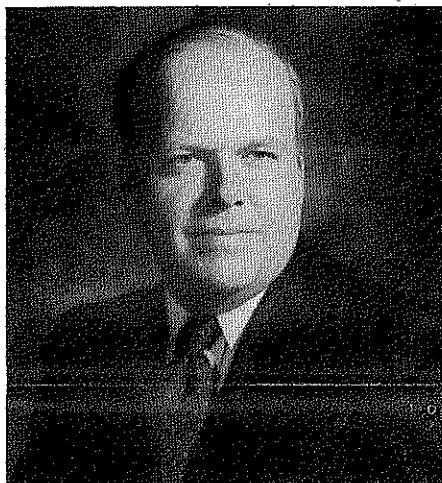

HAROLD A. MAUS

Joseph R. Mauro, Director of Agencies, recently announced that Harold A. Maus, F.I.C., of the Raymond J. Reed Agency has been named the Fraternal Insurance Counsellor of the Year.

Harold is a Past Grand Knight of Jersey City Council #137 and presently a member of Union Council #4504. He has been a Field Agent for the past seven years and has led the Ray Reed Agency for five years and has been the leading agent in the state for the past three years. In 1977, Harold became the first agent to issue more than 200 certificates in one year since 1957. In 1977, he issued 228 certificates and had approved \$2,500,000 in coverage for Brother Knights, which is also the first time this has been accomplished.

Maus is a member of the Million Dollar Round Table — an international organization of the top 2% of all agents in the world, holder of National Quality Award and National Sales Award for the past six years, past president of the New Jersey Fraternal Insurance Counsellors, and on the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Fraternal Congress.

Brother Maus was cited for his exceptional service to families of deceased members, accompanying widows to Social Security, Veterans Administration and other government agencies. These services were performed within twenty-four hours of the initial contact with the widow. Besides attending to the needs of the members, Harold has served as President of the Parish Council in Corpus Christi, Hasbrouck Heights.

He is married to the former Loretta Murphy of Jersey City and the father of three children who attend Corpus Christi School.

General Agent Raymond J. Reed stated that Harold is more than just an insurance agent, serving as friend and advisor to many who have attested to his service with personal letters to his office and the Home Office.

Brother Maus will receive this award at the National Convention of the Fraternal Insurance Counsellors in Omaha on May 5, 1978.

Swim Club Splashes

The Board of Directors has voted to raise the age limit of an adult from sixteen to eighteen starting this season. Previously, for our purposes, a person reaching the age of sixteen was issued an adult badge. In order to bring our system into accord with the legal adult age we will now issue an adult badge when a person becomes eighteen. This means that some people who had adult badges last year will revert to the middle category of badges 12-17. Please advise your sons and daughters of this change so we will not be deluged with complaints of wrong badges being issued.

The Board also advises parents to enroll their children in swimming instruction class. A child who is not afforded the opportunity to learn to swim is being short changed for life. We live in a state where water sports and water oriented vacation resorts abound. To enjoy these assets safely urge your children to learn to swim. It could save his life at some future date. We have taught hundreds of children to swim at our facilities and many have advanced to accredited life saving status. We present a well rounded program and invite one and all to participate.

We also have a swim team and are participants in a club league. We invite youth of all ages to try out for the swim team. It means daily practice at 10:00 a.m. but the rewards of a disciplined competition may be enjoyed by those who wish to put forth the effort.

To those new families whose young children have a red octagon shaped badge we remind you your duty is to instruct your child he is to use the shallow water end of the pool — from the safety rope toward the locker room **only** until he or she passes the deep water test administered by the life guards. Upon passing the test the red lettered badge will be exchanged for the permanent 1978 gold lettered badge for the 0-11 age group. This also means that the possessor of a red badge may not go beyond the safety rope even if accompanied by an adult. It is important for the safety of our people that these rules be strictly adhered to.

We urge that all members familiarize themselves with the rules governing use of pool facilities and cooperate fully with our staff so we may have a pleasant accident free season. One last admonition. no diapered babies are allowed in the main pool. Children must be toilet trained to avoid an accident that could close down the pool for days.

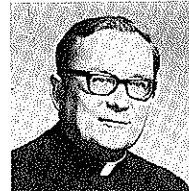

WHAT IS HAPPENING TO FAMILIES?

A casual glance through your morning paper tells the story. The family appears to be doddering toward an ineffective old age. After thousands of years as society's most basic and useful unit, the family now seems to be unhappily declining into the twilight of a "do your own thing" world.

Couples are splitting up right and left. Young children are increasingly influenced by their peers and television. More and more teenagers are becoming alcoholics or killing themselves. Grandparents are disappearing into nursing homes.

At the same time single family housing is priced beyond reach. Schools are unresponsive to parents. The media heroizes behavior contrary to family values. And bureaucrats cheerfully spend our tax dollars without caring how their programs affect the family.

We parents are responsible for the well being of our families. Society claims to be committed to helping us. But, in reality, it often turns its back and walks away from us.

We are, in fact, losing our traditional respect and control because many of society's influences actually have a negative effect on our families. And we have been unjustly blaming ourselves for problems pressed upon us by outside forces.

HOW CAN WE STOP THIS ALARMING DETERIORATION OF THE FAMILY?

Beginning now we're mobilizing the largest constituency in our society — PARENTS! We're organizing our strength and asserting our rights. Anyone who has an impact on the family, from politicians and bureaucrats to educators and the media, will hear from us and face our power.

- We're going to enlighten and persuade policy makers to work for what's good for families.
- We're going to ensure that parents become a basic resource in forming and carrying out programs that affect families.
- We're going to raise the consciousness of other parents so they will join us in an effective organization that deals with local as well as national family issues.
- Above all, we're going to restore the dignity to parents and the values to

WHAT IS OUR POWER BASE?

The National Parents' Right Coalition was formed in June 1977 when 60 couples from 26 states met in Chicago under the auspices of Catholic Charities and created an organization to promote and defend the interests of the family.

Local chapters are the strength of the National Parents' Rights Coalition. These autonomous groups from communities throughout the nation identify and work on issues of concern to families in their neighborhoods. Installing a stop sign on a busy street near a school; prohibiting local TV programming of excessively violent or sexual shows; obtaining recreational facilities for teenagers; stopping the display and sale of pornography — these are the kinds of issues local groups are getting involved with.

And local chapters join together through a national coalition on issues of national impact . . . issues that will be presented at major forums like the White House Conference for Families in Washington, D.C.

A national resource office helps local chapters organize and offers consultation; leadership and staff training; issue research; promotional materials; coordinating local groups on common issues; staffing national issues; and organizing conferences and special events.

WHERE DO YOU STAND?

The National Parents' Rights Coalition seeks to have 1,000,000 members in two years. If only 20,000 parents join us from each state this goal will be reached.

With thousands of parents across the country speaking for the family, the policy makers of our society will have no choice but to listen to our voices and support our values.

What's A Flag?

What's the love of country for which it stands? It begins with love of the land itself. It is the fog rolling in with the tide at Eastport. It is the sun coming up behind the White Mountains. The Mississippi rolling swift and muddy past St. Louis. It is lazy moontide in the pines of Carolina, the sea of wheat in Western Kansas, and the San Francisco peaks far north across the nakedness of Arizona.

It is men at work. The farmer riding his great machine in the dust of harvest, the linemen mending the broken wire, the servants of fire in Pittsburgh, trucks rumbling through the night, the pilot in the clouds, the riveter running along the beam a hundred feet in the air. It is the clerk in the office, the housewife doing the dishes and sending the children off to school. It is the teacher, doctor and religious tending and helping, body and soul, for small reward.

It is small things remembered, the little corners of the land, the houses, the people that each one loves. It is voices that are remembered only, no longer heard. It is parents, friends, the lazy chat of street, store and office, and the ease of mind that makes life tranquil.

It is stories told. It is the Pilgrims dying in their first dreadful winter. It is Minutemen standing their ground at Concord Bridge, and dying there. It is the wagons and the men on foot going westward. Its Lee riding home from Appomattox. It is corruption and disgrace, answered always by men who would not let the flag lie in the dust, who have stood up in every generation to fight for the old ideals and the old nights, at risk of ruin or of life itself.

It is a great multitude of people on pilgrimage, common people, charged with the usual human failings, yet filled with such a hope as never caught the imaginations and the hearts of any nation on earth before. The hope of liberty. The hope of justice. The land, the people and the flag — the land a continent, the people of every race, the flag a symbol of what humanity may aspire to when the wars are over and the barriers are down. To these each generation must be dedicated and consecrated anew, to defend with life itself, if need be, but, above all, in friendliness, in hope and courage.

The words you have just read, were taken from the New York Times from an editorial written on Flag Day 1940!!
