In lieu of the Williamstown Pilgrimage State Deputy Frank Brady has inaugurated "Project Concern". This direct-action project will manifest itself on Sunday, October 27th when Knights of Columbus throughout the State of New Jersey will go door-to-door to solicit donations for the starving children of Biafra.

Union Council will conduct its program from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. on a house to house basis and volunteers are urgently needed in this most needy cause. This is not the time to say "I don't want to get involved". Call Andy Popp or the Grand Knight and volunteer a few hours. Andy can be reached at 688-6951, or come down to the Council at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 27th. We need your help — the children of Biafra need your help. Let's not have it be said that we didn't care — or didn't have time. Thousands of children are starving to death daily. You will sleep better for helping . . .

The Vatican Council views Christian social action as one of the great works in the temporal Order. In this the Council does not utter mere generalities. It says: "Wherever there are people in need of food and drink, clothing, housing, medicine, employment, education; wherever men lack the means necessary for living a truly human life or are afflicted with serious distress or illness or suffer exile or imprisonment, there Christian charity should seek them and find them, console them with great solicitude, and help with appropriate relief. This obligation rests above all upon every prosperous nation and person."

There are many nominal Christians who are not properly interested in their fellow man. They can find excuses for avoiding contact with the less fortunate by concluding that poverty is always the result of sloth and that "these people like it this way." Why disturb them? Why bother? Failure to recognize the tremendous effect of environment and ailments on the character and action of men, and failure to remedy these sociological problems will be a heavy indictment on the men of our age. To willfully neglect to care for others in real need will bring condemnation not only from our own generation and the next, but from Christ Himself. Curiously, the Last Judgment scene is depicted as being conducted on the basis of sins of omission: not feeding the hungry, not clothing the naked, not visiting the sick and imprisoned, not sheltering the homeless. "As long as you did not do it to one of these, the least of my brethren, you did not do it to me."

They try perfidiously to worm their way even into professedly Catholic and Religious organizations . . .

In his book "Masters of Deceit" Mr. J. Edgar Hoover makes the same point.

It does well to note that both of these esteemed people pointed out, years ago, long before any of the present controversies were even thought of, that the present situation WOULD happen. It wasn't conjecture, but a cogent analysis of the tactics of Atheistic Materialism.

It would be wrong to imply, nor should it be inferred, that any and all, particularly in the religious community who cry "peace", are spouting the Communist line. What does puzzle us though is that in some of the cases involved, the cry of "peace" is accompanied by acts that are anti-American, lawless and border on anarchy.

It sure seems that Pope Pius XI, quoted above, knew what he was talking about.




