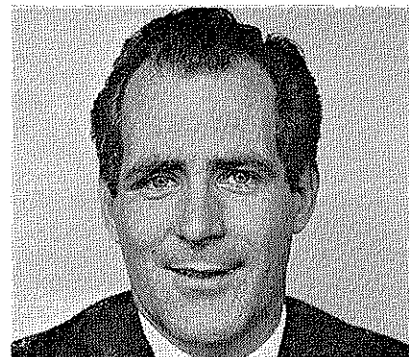

His most recent assignment, and most strenuous, was a five month tour of Vietnam during which he interviewed soldiers, sailors and marines at various installations and outposts throughout the country. In addition he covered the recent Vietnam elections. Over 120 articles thrilled readers of the Newark News over this five month period.

Vince, who now resides at 524 Sherman Avenue in Roselle Park, was born in Elizabeth. He lived in Union for 29 years and has spent the last 8 years in Roselle Park. A graduate of Seton Hall Prep, Vince also attended Seton Hall College. He spent two years in the Marine Corps Reserve and 4 years in the U. S. Air Force.

He is married to Jeanne McGonnell of Union and has 3 children, Laureen 13, Kenneth J. 12, and Donna Jeanne 8. A parishioner of St. Genevieve's in Elizabeth Vince is also a charter member of Union Council. He is one of three men who received Union Council's first "Knight of the Year" award in 1959. Vince also served as the first editor of the 'Knight Digest'.

But even if we were to avoid the stores and movie houses that deal in filth as a matter of economics we would still not be free from the stench. The protective walls which fond parents build around their children against the evils of lewdness are being punctured and pierced by the man to whom we attribute the least intent to do harm, the mailman. It is estimated that over two million teen-agers are receiving unsolicited obscene mail. Against the will of the mailman he is being compelled to deliver to God-fearing people, packets of vulgarity. CONSERVATION

At every meeting, those who are present hear the Grand Knight call on the Conservation Committee for a report. Conservation means to save. That brothers, is what the Conservation Committee is dedicated to do—

Let's try to explain what we mean by extra work by citing the case of a typical delinquent member. Let us call him "K. C. Buster". When Mr. K. C. Buster was initiated into the order it was explained to him that all dues are paid in advance, either quarterly, semi-annually, or annually. Since he pays his first six months dues even before the exemption of the first degree of the order one might think this would remain imprinted on his mind. Not so, however in Mr. Buster's case.

Let us assume Mr. Buster joined up in January. His dues, being paid in advance, are therefore paid until June 30. On July 1 the dues for the next quarter are due, and if not paid on that date, immediately, according to the rules of the order, the member is classified as delinquent. The Financial Secretary, prior to July 1 has sent out a dues billing to Mr. K. C. Buster.

Since it is summer and vacation time however, Mr. Buster figures the dues are not very important to the Council and anyway, he can use it better. Meanwhile, the Financial Secretary has sent out second and third notices or billings. Time passes rapidly in the summer though, especially when one is on vacation. Soon the summer is over and the Financial Secretary now sends out quarterly billings for dues which are payable on October 1. In Mr. Buster's case the dues are now double because of his delinquency; he is now six months behind and dues paying becomes a chore. He can't quite understand why he keeps getting notices — yes, the Financial Secretary will send out second and third notices for this period too!

Thus far the only one K. C. Buster has inconvenienced is the Financial Secretary. He has made four extra mailings to this one member. Now, having let the dues slide, which incidentally comes easy to our friend, the full six months have elapsed and the next quarterly dues are due, and things are now getting expensive for Mr. Buster. Another notice is sent to Mr. Buster but in addition, at this time, the Council Officers are notified of the delinquency. This adds 15 more people that have now been inconvenienced. The Officers turn his name over to the chairman of the Conservation Committee, adding one more name to the ever growing list. The Conservation chairman contacts Mr. K. C. Buster to determine if he is still interested in the Knights of Columbus, if not, what can be done to rectify the matter and if and when he will pay his arrears. In most cases Mr. Buster grudgingly pays up his dues and in many cases will
