Blood Bank

Do you realize that with 701 brother Knights, there are approximately 1500 people who are eligible to draw from the blood bank? At present there are about 38 units on hand. It certainly would not take too many serious illnesses from the above group to quickly deplete this amount. During one period alone last year, 12 pints were given to one brother.

It is our intention to have only ONE major blood donor's day for this council year. The tentative date is November 10, 1963.

People who are eligible to give are brother Knights, their wives and children twenty-one years of age or older - the very same people who are eligible to receive.

Remember, if you are able, be present at the next donor's day with the thought in mind that the blood you may be giving now may be returned to you or your family at some future date.

Grand Knight's Message



Brothers:

It is on a very happy note that we start this message, since on this day our council enjoyed its largest representation on our Annual Pilgrimage for Peace to Williamstown. While the figures are not yet available, it appeared that this was the most successful year ever in this statewide Catholic action. Since our hard working Catholic Activities Chairman, Jim Moran, and our Pilgrimage Chairman, Frank Scherer, will make a detailed report on this, suffice to say the officers of Union Council are extremely happy and proud of the progress made this year.

Our elation on this particular day was tempered, however, by the fact that in Birmingham, Alabama, an atrocity was committed that shocked the nation. Certainly those responsible for the bombing of the Negro church that claimed the lives of four children could not have been schooled in the rudiments of God's Holy Laws, whether the interpretation of those laws be Catholic, Protestant or

Jewish.

This terrible act points up a definite lack of religious training in our lives in this day and age. At every turn in our daily lives, it has become a definite challenge for those of us who believe in God to stand up and fight against the forces who would destroy religion and forbid its teaching or even the smallest reference to it in public life. These anti-religious fanatics must be recognized for the menace they are to our society.

The time has come for each and every one of us to take a long hard lock at our personal attitudes toward the situation in which we find ourselves. We can not curl up and hide in some corner with the thought "It can't happen here", or "It can't happen to me," nor can we continue with a complete disregard to the apparent deterioration that is setting in and gnawing at the innards of our society.

Our apathy is rubbing off on our children and is shown by the complete disregard for law and order in many instances. The children are not wholly to blame for this. We parents must assume our proper responsibilities in the raising of our children. If we can not lead our children, teach them right from wrong

and instill the fear of God in them, what will our society be like in the next generation?

The parents who do not make certain that their children receive a good religious education are doing them a grave injustice. They can only grow into cynical, materialistic men and women with no capacity for love nor understanding, Failure to insure their religious education will surrender their impressionable minds to those who are constantly striving to drive a wedge between God and man. They can not be considered equipped to face these pit-talls of life if they are not schooled properly. They are then easy prey to the forces of evil. Giving them the physical training without the spiritual knowledge is akin to pitting a rank amateur against a polished professional. It simply is no contest.

We as Knights can and must by leading exemplary lives do much to combat these evils. Be then, a true Knight of Columbus.


