## Maus Does It Again!

Raymond J. Reed, FIC, General Agent for the Central Division, announced that Field Agent Harold A. Maus, FIC, broke all records in the State of New Jersey in 1978. To the Chinese, He will bring His bruised and torn Body and the halt, and lame, and blind, the hungry and the famished, will bring their healing hands and cover up from sight those imprints of a night forever past. To the people of India, He will show His open wounded side, and they who sought their peace in a Nirvana of unconsciousness, will be drowned at last in the Sacred Heart, in a love that is a healing of the soul.

Finally, He Who went into darkness through a crown of thorns, will turn to Africa and the people of the midnight Madonnas, and they shall pluck out His thorns, and crown Him with blossoms and with flowers as white as their souls, as perfumed as their faith.

# Living May Be Hazardous to Your Health IV

Each of us every day exposes himself to countless risks to his health, some known, many suspected and others yet to be uncovered. The cigarettes we smoke, the alcohol we drink, the diet we eat, the automobiles we drive, even the air we breathe may represent substantial risks. It is safe to say that for most people who engage in risk-taking there are benefits which seem to outweigh the risks. These benefits may consist of nothing more of less than the satisfaction of some basic urge, but I suspect that "we can no more eliminate smoking, drinking or gluttony by appealing to a desire for 'good health' than we can eliminate lust by declaring sex immoral." There are a number of thoughtful physicians who have decided that at least for them, smoking is preferable to not smoking. As smokers who have tried to stop smoking can attest, quitting carries its own substantial risks. We cannot prevent the common cold by taking Vitamin C or dressing warmly, we cannot prevent mental illness by avoiding food additives. The argument here is that we acknowledge our ignorance and stop acting as if we know more than we really do. We are all victimized by unknown causes, by fate or even by ordinary bad luck. Some individuals will be reluctant to give up this cherished notion of control over illness and health and will chose to mold their lifestyle as if the control were theirs. We should continue our attempts to reduce air and water pollution, prevent drunken driving and so on. But we cannot and should not presume to be able to calculate the risk - benefit ratio for each member of our society. What we must not allow is for society to make these choices for individuals.
