

Hollywood Report

Hollywood is in the middle of a financial crisis. Unemployment is very high in the movie industry and related fields. All the studios are deeply in debt, with little improvement in sight. Twentieth Century Fox is over 200 million dollars in debt. The studios are producing some films for T.V., but few for the theaters, Independent producers do not need or want studio lots or equipment. They have traveling units and film mostly on location. The pictures they make are mostly anti-establishment themes and cater to the young market. Films in recent years have featured nudity and other forms of sex display. A handful of these are hits, most are failures. The middle class, middle age and very young people are staying away from movies. Few family pictures are available, so these people stay home and

watch television. The middle age public will not leave his free T.V. (or more) movie, if he thinks it will offend his idea on sex and morals. Hollywood is starting to realize clean movies are money makers. "Love Story", a picture of young love (aside from frank language) should be enjoyed by most upper teenagers and adults. It made over 2 million dollars in the first three days of release throughout the country.

In one week it got back its entire investment, and saved the studio that produced it (Paramount) from near disaster. "Ryans Daughter" is an excellent picture (two minor objectional scenes) for most families. The money it's making is also helping to save a studio. "Scrooge" made \$365,000 in one week at Radio City Music Hall, appearing with the Christmas Show. Aside from the

Music Hall engagement, it's doing well country wide. Large lines at the box office in very cold weather, have attended these pictures, and prove the public wants this type of movie. Proof that Hollywood is starting to recognize this new trend, is that "My Fair Lady" a 1964 musical has been re-issued in New York and drew good crowds. Lots of young people too. On Wednesday evening the 8:45 show had a line in the lobby waiting for admittance. Very unusual for a week day evening. Hollywood has had its fling; with uninhibited sex and old taboos of the screen. The public has accepted a great deal of it, but now like any overdone theme, its dying. Most of us welcome this trend and if it means money to Hollywood, as well as independent producers, they'll give us better movies, or go out of business.

Generation Problem?

Is the younger generation better educated? To my surprise the answer is no. "But they are more sophisticated. Through television they have been exposed to world problems as their elders were not. They have had more and probably better schooling. On the other hand, they have been kept longer and in larger numbers away from the world of actual experience. As a result, in many ways they are more naive. They grossly underestimate the complexities of the problems about which they show concern. If we could effectively tie them into adult responsibilities, they might become better than their elders. Study that quoted answer. It says a great deal in a few words. Did it ever occur to you to ask your teenager advice? Foolish question? Not really. "In many ways he is more knowledgeable than you, especially about what is going on in the youth culture to which he belongs. It is a wise parent who has learned to listen to his children, and to hear what they are trying to say. When differences between the generations occur a father may say to his son "I don't see it your way, perhaps you'd better tell me what this means to you. You more than I have first hand experience with this situation, so let's advise one another on what it involves." This not only calms the troubled water, but shows the boy how a mature man meets a difference in point of view.'

"Ray, before I turn things back over to you, I would like to make an observavation of my own about what I've noticed. People have developed quite a monetary attitude about Christmas. 'X' is the mathematical symbol for an unknown quantity. So many merchants display the sign 'X-mas Specials' as if they didn't know what Christmas was all about. 'Christmas' is the celebration of Christ's birthday and Christ is not an unknown quantity - He should be a very real part of our lives. Maybe my attitude is way off base, but in the meantime this has been Steven Bartlett reporting for CBS News and Commentary from midtown Manhattan, Merry Christmas!"

"Thank you Steve, and Merry Christmas to you too ... Steve has made some very interesting comments, and I would like to close tonight's broadcast by reading a composition my 12 year old son wrote for school. It is entitled 'Keep-Christ in Christmas'...

One of the most joyous and blessed days of the year is Christmas, December 25, the day on which Our Saviour was born in the Holy Land. Bethlehem marks the birthplace of the Child who brought new faith and new hope into the world. Simple shepherds and Wise Men alike knelt before the Holy Infant in adoration.

Today, men, women and children crowd into churches to show their gratitude. 'Glory be to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men of good will' is truly the motto of all festivities on this happy occasion. The splendor and beauty associated with our present day celebrations is very different from the humble stable in Bethlehem where Christ was born, but the message remains the same.

The giving of presents is also part of Christmas. The custom seems to go back to the ancient Romans who distributed gifts during their midwinter festival. The Wise Men, or Magi, mentioned in the Bible story of Christ's birth, brought gifts to the Christ Child on the twelfth day after his birth.

The Christmas tree came into general use in comparatively recent times. It is not known exactly how the tradition started or who originated the idea of a 'Christmas tree', but by the beginning of the nineteenth century, nearly all of Germany had adopted the tree as a yuletide symbol. The tradition soon spread to most of the countries in Northern Europe and to the Americas, but Christmas trees are still unusual in Italy, Spain and Latin America.

Traditions and symbols are important aspects of any feast or holiday, but the most essential element of the Christmas 'holy day' is that every community brings some sort of special joy to its less fortunate members, Schools, church organizations and charitable civic groups collect food and clothing to be given to the poor. Many groups bring entertainment and presents to children whose parents cannot afford to do so themselves.

Presents, trees, greeting cards and carols are all reminders that this is the season for love and reunion with friends and relatives. In a broader sense, it is a time to reemphasize that Christmas is 'Christ's Mass' - a Mass in which the whole world takes part to hear and practice the Christian doctrine of love. It is therefore not a time of 'I want', but rather a time of 'I would like to give', -to give not necessarily materially, but spiritually. No gift, no matter how great, has any true meaning unless it is given with sincere love.

It has been said that "the greatest thing a man can do is lay down his life for his friends." Whereas we are oft-times too selfish to even think about our neighbor, Christ had so much love as to willingly die on the Cross for man. Although things may all seem to go wrong, Christ's guiding hand is never far away. The earth is always turning, but the Cross stands erect forever. Consideration, hope and faith will help us become a united people. NOW is the time to put the 'Christ' back into 'X-mas!...

Keep Christ in Christmas

We should not have to say "Keep Christ in Christmas" because without Christ there would be no Christmas. This day is Christ's birthday and this should be the reason for celebration. It was His own choice to be born to this world to save us. Then, shouldn't we at least remember Him on His day of birth in the way that He would have wished.

Christmas has become much too commercial. Instead of God being the main character on this holyday, Santa Claus would seem to be the center of attraction. Replacing scenes of the stable where our Lord was born, we come across bright ornaments stressing Santa and his reindeer. If the money spent on gifts and wrapping paper was used for better causes, such as feeding the poor, this would be a much nicer world to live in.

The true Christmas spirit could be kept alive much more in charitable acts such as visiting the poor and lonely than in decorating houses or Christmas shopping.

Some of the customs which developed around Christmas time started beautifully, but then lost their true meaning. One such custom is the exchange of Christmas cards. This could be a beautiful custom as it reflects shared beliefs in the mystery and miracle of Christ's offering of Himself to the world. However, Christmas cards mostly do not show the religious side of Christmas, rather the commercial. Also, the fact

Christmas cards are sent does not necessarily mean the sender believes in the true meaning of the day, as in many cases, the sending of these cards has become sort of a "keeping up with the Joneses" situation. In fact some of these cards do not even mention the word Christmas!

What about the customary "Merry Christmas" people cry out as they meet each other for the first time on Christmas morning? Here again the custom is universal, followed by those who do not believe in Christ as well as by Christians. It is not suggested that non Christians should stop saying "Merry Christmas" when they meet each other and their Christian neighbors on Christ's birthday, but in these days when being meaningful counts for much, it would be nice if they learned the real meaning of the words: "May the peace, the love, simplicity and unworldliness of Christ be yours on this day of His appearance among us." This could be the sentiment at Christmas even of non-Christians.

We depend on god for our existence, and the tribute we give Him on His human birthday is not nearly enough. Our faith must be very weak if we can't respect Him on His own birthday. When we are brought before Him for final judgment, I'm sure He will consider our behavior on this day.

From the joint communique of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines on civic responsibility, July 1970.

We must not wait for the State to do everything for us. It is true that the primary obligation to maintain public order, promote public welfare and correct social injustices rests on the State. But the State alone, without the cooperation of the citizenry, cannot attain these ends. In the final analysis, in a democracy the responsibility for good government rests on every citizen, and the failure of government is the failure of every citizen. The duty of establishing a just regime does not rest on the shoulders of the politician alone. It rests on the shoulders of all citizens. And for the Christian citizen this duty is more binding because for him it is a duty not only to a fellow citizen but also to Christ Himself.

And so it is the duty of the Christian citizen to stand up and be counted in all matters affecting the public welfare. It is the duty of the Christian citizen to conscientiously participate in the political life of the country. It is his duty to break the silence of the "silent majority" when injustice is committed, when those in public office fail in their obligations.




My Brother Knights:
