Knights of Columbus Emblem Designed in 1883

The Knights of Columbus emblem dates from the Second Supreme meeting May 12, 1883, when it was designed by James T. Mullen, who was the first Supreme Knight.

A quick glance at the emblem indicates a shield mounted upon the cross of Malta. The shield is that associated with a medieval knight. The cross of Malta is the representation in a traditionally artistic design of the Cross of Christ through which all the graces of redemption were procured for mankind. This, then, represents the Catholic spirit of the order.

Mounted on the shield are three objects, a mace standing vertically and, crossed behind it, an anchor and a dagger or short sword. The mace from Roman days is symbolic of authority which must exist in any tightly bonded and efficiently operating organization. The anchor is the mariner's symbol for Columbus, patron of the K. of C., while the short sword or dagger was the weapon of the knight when engaged upon an errand of mercy.

Thus, the shield expresses Catholic knighthood in organized merciful action and with the letters "K. of C.", it proclaims this specific form of activity.


The red, white and blue colors in the background of the Cross of Malta are the colors of our beloved country. As such, red is the symbol of stout hearted courage, of pulsing activity and a full measure of devotion. Blue is the symbol of hope, of calm tranquility under God and of confidence in the protection of our country, established under God. White is the symbol of mobility of purpose, of purity of aim and of crucible tried ideals to be carried out.

But there is another symbolism of color in red, white and blue. This is the ecclesiastical symbolism in which red becomes the reflection of the drops of Christ's redemptive blood shed on Calvary, and of the Martyrs' blood shed in defense of the Faith.

Red is then the symbol of Faith, of belief in Christ, in the Redemptive and in the mission of every man to spread the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ. White is the color of the Eucharistic Host, pledge of God's Eucharistic presence among men, of the infinite love God had for man and of the overwhelming affection which the God-man had for each individual. White is then the symbol of Christ-like charity. Blue is the color of Our Lady's mantle, in which she draped her beloved Son, through whom salvation came to a sinful world. Blue is then the symbol of Hope.

Chaplain's Corner

It is amazing how careless some are about the knowledge of their religion. The Pope and some 2,600 membered Bishops of the Catholic Church at the Vatican Council were very serious on this matter.

The decree on the pastoral office of bishops of the Vatican Council points out that it is the "mission of the Church to CONVERSE with the human society in which it lives." Thus it is the "duty of bishops" to both request and promote dialogues with men and to seek them out to do so. The decree then sets the tone for these "conversations on salvation they should be noted for clarity of speech as well as humility and mildness" so that always Faith may be joined to Charity and understanding with love.' Also these conversations should be marked by "due prudence joined with trust, which fosters friendship."

The bishops are also requested "to make use of the various media at hand nowadays for proclaiming Christian Doctrine." Preaching and catechetical instruction are listed as holding first place; followed by presentation of Christian Doctrine through schools, conferences, meetings — in fact any proper means. Special emphasis is given to the press and other means of mass communication, which, the decree says, "by all means ought to be used in proclaiming the Gospel of Christ." In a world where there is much competition through the press, radio and television for the public's attention, Christians too must compete to present Christ's message.

Catechetical instruction should be presented carefully and effectively. Those giving the instruction, the catechists, should be well trained themselves so they can and will be effective teachers; the method of teaching should be adopted to the character, ability, age and circumstances of the life of the students" — which is, after all, the proper method of teaching.

This is the attitude of the Bishops. What is yours? Apathy? Indifference? Couldn't care less? When is the last time you read a book on some aspect of your Catholic faith? A Catholic magazine? How about the Advocate, our Newark Archdiocesan newspaper? If you have children of school age, have you looked at their religion books? Do you know what your children are being taught and how? Do you talk with your children at home about what happened in religion class? The way the children are being taught is a chance for you to re-learn your faith. Faith without information and nourishment, especially in these times, is a faith which needs help. Know your faith; work at knowing it: to know Christ is to live Christ.
