OPERATION CONCERN 1972 WILKES-BARRE FLOOD RELIEF

This year the New Jersey State Council K of C is undertaking the project of aiding the victims of tropical storm Agnes in the Wilkes-Barre area of Pa. Some of us have roots in Pa. and all of us know someone who comes from Pa. We feel this almost as a personal disaster. A few weeks ago our State Advocate, Joseph Luciano; State Program Director, Robert Wade and State Director of Community Activities, Joseph Gonnello, visited the area and came away with a feeling of disbelief. However, the thing that impressed this group most was the spirit of the people. Most intended to remain and rebuild.

Operation Concern's effort is divided into two parts, Fund Raising and Providing Manpower and Materials for the stricken area.

On October 23, the membership of Union Council 4504, at its regular business meeting, unanimously passed a resolution to donate the profits from the minstrel show held last April to this worthwhile cause.

But are we going to stop there? Help is needed to clean and rebuild the area. Arrangements have been made through Community Activities Director Joe Gonnello to muster New Jersey K of C Councils to provide Material and Manpower for the striken area. Brother Knights all throughout the State are responding to the call.



Dom is employed as a salesman for E. F. Hauserman Company of Hillside.


All the Knights of the Month of Union seem to have a general rule; and that is to be classified as willing workers whenever needed. Thank you Dom, for not being an exception to that rule.


