
# JFK Assembly 4th Degree Activities

#### **Swim Club News**





A special thanks goes to those who gave their time and blood. They are too numerous to mention. Anyone I may have overlooked please forgive me.


For those who couldn't make the Blood Bank Program, the menu offered was as follows:

# Chaplain's Corner

Advent is meant to be a season of silence. A season of thought and meditation. A season of penance and discipline. It is the great hush in anticipation of the coming of God's special graces to us . . .

Advent is what the world needs — if it would only use it. Each of us needs its healing. It is a time for each of us to "get our bearings" again.

It is sad to see this short season before Christmas neglected. Instead of slowing down and doing a little penance and meditation in a spirit of silence, we yield to modern pressures and make Advent a whirlwind of straw chasing. The pools of our souls are not widened and deepened by it. We arrive at Christmas in the very opposite condition — tattered and frustrated, dry and empty.

Advent is a St. John the Baptist. It is the forerunner of the Savior.

This is the season, therefore, when we ask what life is all about. It is a picnic or is it a reality deadly serious? Santa Claus in the dime store is not qualified to give the correct answer.

"When you are marching in a parade," writes Father Robert Frewen, "you cannot see it. You are not able to see where it begins or where it ends and the different units in it. All you can see are the few people to the front and to the side of you. If you really wish to view the parade, you would have to step out of the line of march and watch it go by.

"Life is a parade in which every man, woman, and child is a marcher. Yet it is very important to get a look at the parade — to see where it began and where it ends and your own place in it. However, there is only one way to view it and that is to step out of the line of march, stand on the curb, and watch it go by."

The streets are decorated with Christmas reminders; the stores are packed with items for sale; people are in the midst of the Christmas rush. Yet Christmas means peace. The birth of Jesus was the birth of the Prince of Peace; the angels sang about peace to men of good will. I wish you, brother members of the Council, true Christmas peace . . . peace in the world, in our towns, peace in your homes, peace in your hearts. 
