

#### STATE AWARDS

At the annual State Convention held at Atlantic City on May 14, 15, and 16 Union Council was presented the top three State Awards shown above. On the left in the picture, is the State Deputy Award for the Best Council Bulletin in the State — the Knight Digest; center, is the Ceremonial Trophy, for the Best Degree work by Council Officers in the State; and on the right, the Century Club Award, for a net gain in membership of 114 members. The Digest was also selected as the Best Council Bulletin in the Archdiocese of Newark.

In addition to the awards presented to Union Council, our District Deputy Dennis J. Burke, Jr., PGK, was honored as District Deputy of the Year.

We can be proud, not only of the awards received at the convention, but of all the achievements of our Council in the past year, which are indicative of the enthusiasm and unity of purpose and action, which has made Union Council what it is today.

# SUPPORT YOUR COUNCIL ACTIVELY

#### PUBLIC DECENCY

An all day State-wide Public Decency Seminar was held on May 1 at the College of Saint Elizabeth, Convent Station, N. J. The seminar was presented by the Knights of Columbus State Committee for Public Decency under the direction of Chairman George E. Emery. Cooperating organizations were the Holy Name Society, National Council of Catholic Men, Citizens for Decent Literature and Operation Yorkville.

The primary objectives of the Knights of Columbus were outlined by Chairman Emery as follows:

1. To further strengthen the organization of the Knights of Clumbus in New Jersey for increased participation and effectiveness in the fight against Extreme Individualism and its "kissin' cousins" atheism and communism.

To promote interfaith cooperation, unification, and coordination of the efforts of all forces in New Jersey dedicated to promoting Public De-

cency.

Emery in his talk pointed out that the philosophy of Extreme Individualism is that of "anything goes" and the hypocritical cries of "censorship", and "You can't legislate morality", by these promoters of illegal human behavior have already been refuted by a member of the United States Supreme Court. Chief Justice Arthur J. Goldberg has said of this, "If you adopt this thesis, which I think is a very unfortunate thesis, then why adopt any law? The idea that you cannot legislate morality—civilized behavior—is a foolish, nonsensical idea."

State Deputy Stewart A. Schoder, Ir. said that he wanted a Public Deceny organization that would be second to none. After each of the 157 K. of C. Councils in New Jersey have established committees for Public Decency, regional seminars will be held for purposes of uniform orientation on statewide objectives. These will be held in the regions of Trenton, Paterson, Newark and Camden. Schoder said that no one has the right to destroy the innocence of children. He gave the example of Nazi Germany, where Hitler in 1931 supplanted decent literature with trash and sank them to the lowest depths that a country could go.

Raymond D. O'Brien, State Advocate K. of C., presented a resolution asking that a bill be introduced in New Jersey similar to one recently introduced in the New York legislature specifically defining the pro-

scribed pornography.

Assemblywoman Mrs. Mildred
Barry Hughes, already sponsor of
two anti-smut bills, later in the day

announced she would have the legislation drafted and introduced as soon as possible.

Twenty-one speakers addressed the group during the six hour session, appealing for a unified effort and outlining specific areas in which state and local committees can work. Highlights of these talks will be presented at future council meetings.

Union Council will need a large committee to properly put in force the objectives that have been outlined above. We need your active

#### SWIM CLUB STAFF

With the opening of the Swim Club we felt it would be a good idea if we took this opportunity to introduce you to your new pool manager and his staff.

Our pool manager is Joseph A. Spiotta, a graduate of Seton Hall University, presently teaching physical education at Upper School in Englewood Cliffs. Joe is also the chief supervisor of all recreational activities in the community. He is also the assistant to the executive director of the National Council on Physical Fitness.

Our head life guard and assistant manager is Jerome C. Sorensen. A graduate of East Stroudsberg State, Jerry also holds an M.A. Degree from Columbia University: He is presently a guidance counselor at Butler High School.

The two male life guards, (girls) are John Semple and Harry Snyder. Both are students at Seton Hall University majoring in Physical Education. Both John and Harry hold the Red Cross Senior Life Saving certificate, and both are First Aid instructors at the University.

Not wanting to slight some of our male "swimmers", in the event they need some assistance, we have Carolyn Lawton, a sophomore at Albion College, Michigan, where she is majoring in English. Carolyn also holds the senior Life Saving Certificate.

Mona DiFilippo, a graduate of the University of Michigan will be our swimming instructor. Mona is a Physical Education teacher at Abraham Lincoln High School in West Orange, and is the consultant on swimming to the National Council on Physical Fitness. She is a National AAU swimming champion, and the winner of every junior and senior swimming championship in New Jersey. She is also the winner of more than 100 championships in over 12 years of swimming competition. She was voted the outstanding swimmer of the year in 1957, and is nationally prominent as one of the highest point scorers in AAU competition for the past 10 years.

In speaking with Mr. Spiotta he indicated that he plans to have organized activities throughout the year for the adults as well as for the children, both swimming and athletic activities. His program is well planned, and as you can see from the qualifications of his staff, he cer-

tainly has a good start.
