As if this were not enough, I find that friends multiply and good things come to me from every direction. I've decided the world insists on balancing accounts with giversaway — provided that their hands aren't outstretched for favors.

The spirit of Christmas will be abroad on Monday, December 12, when our Council will commemorate the season with it's annual Christmas dinner meeting.



The delegates from Union Council are Walter Wasowski and B. Warren Hehl.




Chaplain's Corner

The Conference of American Bishops in their first meeting has given us a change of concept in directing our spiritual lives. They have indicated to us for our quidance that the obligation of abstaining from meat on Friday should no longer be considered as binding under sin excepting the Fridays of Lent. The Bishops immediately remind us that the relaxation of the law is in no way intended as a stimulus to reduce our understanding of the need of self denial and self discipline. We may continue to abstain from eating meat but need not have our conscience as involved regarding sin. The Bishops as well remind us that in our time self denial in the use of alcohol would be a meaningful substitute for some and a splendid example for others. We are reminded also in the seasons of Lent and Advent to take upon ourselves freely the spirit of self denial so that we might mark ourselves as the followers of Him who took upon himself excruciating suffering to atone for sin.

In this month we celebrate the day that is the focal point in history, the birthday of the Savior of the world, the day that has no other meaning than the explanation to man of God's idea of love. His clear revelation of love's meaning to us may be stated in this way: Man offended God, God's reaction to man's offense was the sending of His Son. The Son's work on earth was the salvation of man. As followers of Christ, we should examine ourselves each day on whether or not we have Christ's reaction to offenses made against us.

This also placed the added burden of having his name placed at the bottom of the waiting list, which in all probability would mean a wait of two to three years before the opportunity arose again.

This may seem harsh, but in all honesty we believe you will agree it is the only fair way to operate. Those of you who are planning on withdrawing from the Swim Club can help us to avoid such situations.

Our sincere apologies to the family of Patrick Gillen for the omission of his name from our memorial list in November's issue.






