

Tuesday, January 22, will again find us busing to Washington, D.C. to participate in the Annual Right to Life March.


A trip to the "Ice Capades" has been planned for January 27. Call Lonny Pannucci at 763-0613 for information and reservations.

## CHRISTIANS IN THE MODERN WORLD

2. Not only is man's outlook on the physical and material changes affected, but he is all the more confused in the area of morality and ethics. The standards of morality have suffered a serious breakdown and are worse than in pagan times. The commandments of God are not known and observed. People do not distinguish between freedom and license; contempt of law, human and divine, is rampant. People want independence from authority, this beginning in the home. They alone want to be judge of what is right or wrong and deem it an interference upon their freedom of conscience if anyone should try to impose restrictions on their behavior.

As a consequence, marriage has lost its sacred character, promiscuity and divorce have become most common, millions of the unborn are murdered and massacred every year, etc.

- 3. But the follower of Christ is not isolated from the social conditions in the world. He is affected adversely by social injustices, by prejudices of race and conditions of life, he is affected by the greed of those who trample on the rights of the weak and poor. The Catholic is part of the scene on which is played a fierce game of success or failure. He cannot hide himself while around him his brother is starving to death, immorality is rampant, life is no longer sacred, the unborn are massacred by the millions, etc.
  - 4. Because Christians are hopefully

citizens of heaven to which they aspire, they must not forget that they are, also, and first, citizens of this world towards which they have duties and responsibilities. To be a Christian is not to deny one's social or economic status in the world.

A Christian should disapprove of those who willfully break the laws of God, but this disapproval does not mean that he should so separate himself as though it were no concern of his. God has made the Christian his brother's keeper. This means we should hold out a helping hand toward all those whose weakness and human nature we share.

5. The Christian's attitude toward human sinfulness, suffering and injustice must really be a compassionate resolve to do all in his power to remedy situations that cause human pain and unhappiness by devoting himself, as much as circumstances allow, to the services of his fellow man. God has placed us in this world to help correct or dispel evil and bring the world back to Him. If the Christian shuts himself from the world, how can he be of any use to God, Who so loved the world as to give His only Son to save it?

The indifference of a Christian to the welfare of his fellow man becomes a positive refusal to serve God. Christ has declared that on the last day, man will be judged by his service to his fellow man, because service to his fellow man is an expression or mark of his love for God. "Anything you did for one of my brothers here, however humble, you did it for me, etc." (Matt. 25-31.)

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#### Vocations — **Everybody's Business Part Three**

The plants in our garden of vocations must have the proper climate in order to grow strong. Part of this is within ourselves, and the second part is of a more public nature. Personal prayer is a motivation each of us has a control over. We must constantly pray that we can be instruments to inspire young men and women into the service of God. Use the Vocation Prayer that is available at our Council meetings. Make this a regular part of your prayer life, and encourage your family to do the same. On the public aspect, your taking part in pro-life, anti-pornography and community service programs helps improve our social and spiritual climate. All these work towards providing the kind of atmosphere in which church vocations can flourish.

The Supreme Council has given guidelines to State, District and Council levels for the administration of effective Vocation ideas. No plans can get very far without some measure of organization. We are trying to achieve a balance between too much organization and too little. If there's too much, there will be no creativity or excitement. If there's too little, there will be confusion. At the Council level, the Grand Knight is ex officio member of the Vocation Committee (as he is in all Council functions). He should have a real commitment to this effort. It is at the local neighborhood parishes that most church vocations need to be discovered and encouraged. The Chairman is the Chancellor of the Council. The Program Director and the Church Activities Director are members of the Vocation Committee, so there is cooperation with other Council programs.

The Council Chaplain is with this group because it's a function of major spiritual importance. The spirit of this group must show their sharing of their Godgiven insights and sense of dedication so that they demonstrate living proof to the presence of Christ among them. We must keep in mind our prime purpose and over-riding policy ought to be that of servants and cooperators with the local Church. This means that our choice of strategies should be arrived at under the guidance of the diocese and local parishes. If we do this, we shall not have an identity crisis but rather organized people ready "for service". There will be projects which Union Council will become involved with on this matter of vocations. We hope, as your Christian and Catholic duty, you'll lend your assistance on these programs.
