

Chaplain's Corner

Perhaps there is no Sunday in the year when the priest is so apt to miss the mark (I was going to say "lay an egg" but I was afraid that some might think it was being sacriligious), as on Easter Sunday. Likewise, writing a column for the Easter minded can be trying because of the varied needs of our readers. It is not the matter as what-do-you say. I know what to say - but how?

To do justice to the mystery of Easter joy with the stale words of human speech is rather difficult. This is so not only because every mystery of the Gospel penetrates only with difficulty into the narrow confines of human life - thereby making it even harder for our words to grasp and contain and express these mysteries but because the Easter message is the most human tidings of Christianity. That is why we find it the most difficult message to understand. For what is most true, most obvious, and most easy, is the most difficult to be, to do, and to believe. That is to say, modern man bases his life on the unexpressed, and therefore all the more self-evident, prejudice that anything "religious" is merely an affair of the most interior heart and of the loftiest spirit - something that we must bring about by ourselves, something that involves the difficulties and unreality of the heart's thoughts and moods.

But Easter tells us that God has done something. God himself has done something. And his action has not merely and gently touched the heart of a man here and there so that he trembles slightly from an ineffable and nameless someone. God has raised his Son from the dead. Yes, His Son, Jesus, willingly accepted to die on the Cross, for the sins of mankind. He literally emptied himself per our sake, for us. He taught all humanity how to forgive one's enemies; He taught us how to forgive-and thereby He won the Gentile world to Christinaity. Yes, God has quickened the flesh. God has conquered death. Jesus has conquered death and He did this on the home ground, home town of Satan. Yes, he defeated the devil on his home territory. How? Upon his resurrection he ascended into Hades and Satan did not know who the resurrected Jesus was because he has knowledge, but not all the knowledge. Only God possesses all the knowledge. So when Jesus appeared his power and glory broke the bondage of sin that existed between him and humanity. This is what we mean - that Jesus conquered death. Now we are

INSURANCE UPDATE

Insurance costs have skyrocketed in New Jersey and Union Council has been hit hard. Total insurance coverage for fire, general liability, liquor law liability, etc. for the Council facilities cost \$2,538 in 1984 and will cost \$15,000 in 1986. That's a 600% increase and it appears that these type of increases may continue.

Operating income to fund these high costs is simply not available. In order to pay the bill for 1986, the Council, Columbian Club and Swim Club withdrew \$5000 each from their respective savings

The three clubs have joined forces to address this problem for 1987. A committee was formed to investigate methods to reduce costs if possible and evaluate the feasibility of running (a) fundraiser(s) to cover or at least offset insurance costs.
