

MONSIGNOR BECK HONORS COUNCIL

Our guest speaker Monsignor Henry G. J. Beck, State Chaplain of the New Jersey Knights of Columbus, gave the membership an inspirational Christmas message and a brief education of the poevery problems of Honduras. After his talk Grand Knight John Winters presented Monsignor Beck a check for \$500.00 from the Union Council 4504, which will be used for "Operation Honduras".

The money was from the proceeds of our "Knight of Nostalgia" show which we gave during the past Spring. The profits were held in the charitable fund for a worthwhile cause. The officers agreed that the feeling of fraternity and brotherhood towards our fellow man could be served by giving this money to aid the poor flood victims of Honduras whose average income (before the flood) was \$300.00 per year.

Abortion — A Medical View

"The increased acceptance of abortion as a legitimate and ethical medical procedure is indicative of the general deterioration of human values and respect for life", according to Dr. James Delahunty, an obstetrician of Somerville, New Jersey. Doctor Delahunty is the cofounder of a group of 700 physicians from all over the country who are opposed to abortions. Although he himself is a catholic, his group is nondenominational. He has said the church has taken "too weak" of a stand against abortion. On the catholic action front and abortion he said further "I've spoken to a number of bishops on the subject, and I think the church is genuinely remiss in not condemning and opposing abortion far more strongly". Catholics and other people who oppose abortion are often criticized for supposedly forcing the views on other people, but in actuality every law on the books forces ethical opinions on people by telling them what they can and can't do. Surely society is forcing its anti-murder view on citizens by forbidding them to kill, yet no one questions that. Doctor Delahunty is not against abortion solely on moral grounds, but says "my whole education as a gynecologist and obstetrician teaches me that abortion is murder".

On the subject of abortion on demand, Dr. Delahunty had these words "I have no respect whatever for someone who calls himself a doctor who would perform an abortion on demand without any indication of medical need. It's normally repugnant, and worse than that, it's bad medicine because it's a non-indicated medical procedure".

The doctor ended a recent interview with this comment "the pro-life people have gotten a generally bad press and I'm not certain that's unintentional. We need better spokesmen and the professionalism that will get the truth across to the people about what abortion really is, why it's wrong, and the social implications of what it can lead to."


I must comment on the fine turnout we had for the evening of recollection. I have heard many favorable reports on the program that was presented. Those who did not attend missed a very inspiring evening.
