


FIRST IN COUNCIL HISTORY

The Union Knights of Columbus Bowling League started as usual on the Wednesday after Labor Day. This year's date was September 5, 1972.


After the first two weeks of bowling, the team leading was Ryan's Express, closely followed (1 point away) by the Golden Five.
