OPEN HOUSE TO BE SEPT. 15

A special open house meeting for all brothers and prospective members of Union Council will be held at the VFW Hall on Monday, Sept. 15, at 8:15 p.m.

Frank J. Murphy, membership committee chairman, said the meeting is designed to introduce prospective brothers to council members and to the order itself. Murphy said a brief but elaborate program has been planned for the event.

Past Deputy George Leary, brother of the Grand Knight Howard R. Leary, will be principal speaker at the open house. Other speakers including Rev. Joseph E. Driscoll, council chaplain, will briefly address the group.

Murphy said any council members who wish to attend will face an admission charge. He said the admission charge will be ONE PROSPECTIVE MEMBER.

The film, titled "These Men Called Knight's" has been secured to be shown at the meeting.

Refreshments will be served.

Murphy and Grand Knight Howard Leary urge all members to bring at least one prospective brother to this meeting.

The first council degree of the season has been tentatively planned for October and a major degree is being scheduled for December. In order to prepare for what are hoped to be large degree classes, Murphy said, the open house program was scheduled.

Murphy said his entire committee is working to make the event a success, membershipwise, and boost the council membership total over the 300 mark by the end of the year. The council now boasts 241 brothers.

WINTER BOWLING LOOP TO BEGIN ON TUESDAY

DEADLINE IS SET FOR INSURANCE, DUES

Financial Secretary Alvin Dietlein this week announced dues and insurance fees for the fourth quarter (October-December) will be due Sept. 30. Dietlein said statements will be mailed to each member beginning Sept. 15 reminding them of that fact.

To save the council money in mailing, postage, etc., Dietlein has requested all members to pay their dues at one of the next three meetings. Dietlein also said members are not restricted to paying dues quarterly. Payments can be made on a yearly basis, Dietlein said, and in any month.

The financial secretary said yearly payments of dues would facilitate council duties.

Speaking of assessments which will be due at the end of this month Dietlein reminded all brothers of failure to pay insurance fees within 30 days from the beginning of the quarter or failure to pay dues within three months of the assessment date, could mean forfeiture of membership.
