The annual Knights of Columbus Retarded Citizens Drive will be held this year on April 21st, 22nd, and 23rd. Union Council #4504 is proud to participate in this yearly drive where the proceeds are donated entirely to help our mentally handicapped brothers and sisters. Last year with your help we collected over 22,000 dollars. These monies were donated to such programs as Camp Fatima, the TMR program conducted in the Burnett Middle School and Special Olympics. Each year we try to expand this program and this year is no exception. With a committee made up of 25 dedicated individuals, we have set forth plans and goals to make this our largest fund raiser to date.
