


The 1985 annual New Jersey State Knights of Columbus Convention to say the least was a success from both a recognition and social stand.













GK Lon Pannucci along with PGK Tom Hornig receives the prestigious Supreme Community Activities Award from State Deputy James Lowe.

Chaplain's Corner

The month of May is dedicated to Mary, the Mother of God. The church had her reasons to place a special emphasis on Mary in this beautiful month. When we lack historical knowledge, then we think that "it just happened." Yet, the Christians in the first two centuries venerated her in the month of May. These Christians knew Mary; they knew where she lived; they knew where she died; and where she was buried. And when they arrived at her tomb and found it empty; they believed that she was born without original sin. These beautiful Christians knew this in the spirit of faith - it wasn't common intellectual knowledge. They knew it in faith.

Since Vatican II we have witnessed a waning in favor of devotion towards the Mother of God. A malaise has set in similar to period in which St. Clement Hofbauer lived and worked in Poland and Germany. The theology professors at the universities were liberal and worldly and they taught half-turths. St. John Neumann; the fourth bishop of Philadelphia likewise incurred this kind of spiritual sickness when he was seminary student in Prague in the 1820's like St. Clement Hofbauer. Both of these Redemptorist saionts clung to the teachings of their parents and they clung to the faith of the peasants of Bohemia and this living faith put them in good stead. They grew up to become canonized saints. Both of them exercised a strong devotion to Mary, the mother of Jesus. Who remembers the names of these liberal professors? They probably ended up in the garbage can of history having affected many students' lives in a negative and empty way!

The same tragedy is awaiting the liberal Catholic priests and liberal bishops who to-day want to be up-to-date in the spirit of Vatican II? They want to be with it whatever "it" is. It is sad to learn that the Blue Army which is a fervent group which propagates the Fatima message is ignored by the liberal clergy. And this hurts me and I'm sure that this lukewarmness hurst you too. All of this liberality will come to pass, perhaps very soon; because Mary has selected her priests and bishops who belong to her movement. This movement under her direction continues to draw her faithful closer to herself and thereby closer to Jesus! Her work is done in a silent way, yet it doesn't appear to be visible — but she is surely leading us to Calvary, to the Cross — to teach us how to suffer with Jesus.

Please remember that if my description fits you, the reader, then if the hat fits —please wear it. No offense intended. I love Mary!
