## November Knight of the Month



**JOSEPH HALBING**

The honor of Knight of the Month has been awarded to Joe Halbing, our senior Council member. Joe became a member of the Knights of Columbus in 1912 in Council #59 in Danbury, Connecticut. He received his 4th Degree in the same Council in 1917. Joe moved to East Orange in 1919, transferring membership to the City of Orange Council where he served as Athletic Chairman and was a member of the Council basketball team.

During the 1930's Joe moved to Union, becoming a member of the Father Canty Council in Hillside and the John F. Kennedy Assembly, 4th Degree. When Union Council was formed in 1957, Joe transferred to Council 4504 and has missed very few meetings since then.

Joe was quite an athlete in his prime years, notably in track. In 1909 he won first place in a three mile race and a silver cup in a fifteen mile race, both events in the "Nutmeg State".

Joe and his wife Helen reside in Union and are communicants of St. Michael's Parish. On November 5th, Joe will celebrate his 90th birthday as well as his 67th year of membership in the Knights of Columbus.

Our Council is happy and proud to present the singular honor of Knight of the Month to Joseph Halbing for his many years of loyalty and enthusiasm to Union Council and the Knights of Columbus. All of our members join in wishing Joe a happy birthday and may God bless both Joe and Helen with health and happiness in the years to come.

## VOCATIONS

*(Continued from Page Two)*

The immediate concern of the Vocation Committee at all levels, from Supreme to local councils, is the fostering of "church" vocations, that is, priesthood, diaconate, religious brotherhood or sisterhood and various lay ministries such as extraordinary ministry of the Eucharist. Since the most acutely felt needs of the present time are in the areas of priesthood and religious life, the main emphasis of our current efforts is fostering these vocations, but not to the exclusion of the layman (that's most of us). We laymen are divided into Christian spouse, Christian parent or Christian single person with variations of status and service. All of us are a pilgrim people of God. In order to have a proper understanding and appreciation of church vocations, we must see them in relation to the Christian vocation in general.

Through the gift of faith and baptism  
*(Continued next column)*

we are called to be one with Christ. This sharing is our basic love relationship with God. As we mature in wisdom, age and grace, our relationship develops moving us in the directions willed by God for our own good and the good of the Church. This unity we share is described very well by Scriptures like the union of a vine and its branches or like the union of a head with its body. When we bring this way of thinking to its logical end, we start to understand this union with Christ is not the rare privilege of some. It is a gift offered to all. Everyone, therefore, has a God-given vocation, a unique role in creation and in relation to the Church. This gives a certain meaning to our slogan "Vocations are Everybody's Business". Once each layman takes on his vocation, its development takes place through dialogue, through a spiraling of gift and response. Our response of "yes" assists us in becoming more Christ-like in personal holiness and in saving service to others.

## Supreme Chaplain's Religion Outline "Role of the Laity in the Church" — Part II

1. The history of lay activity in the Catholic Church goes back to the time of the Apostles. The early Church records many instances of laymen and laywomen spreading the word of Christ. The early Church was a lightly knit community, with the Apostles, and significantly Peter, as leaders and rulers. But it would be foolish to assume that the Apostles did all the work and the other Christians sat and listened. The laymen also spread the good news of the Gospel to their friends and to anyone else who would listen. Christian example and enthusiasm for their religion were edifying and resulted in a great number of conversions. Many potential converts were brought by lay people to the leaders for instructions and final acceptance into the Catholic

## Chaplain's Corner

The Pope has come and gone leaving quite a legacy. Not everyone agrees with what he said, but no one can deny that he spoke clearly and directly about the teachings of our Church. Pope John Paul II also left a legacy of joy, good-will and strong leadership. I did not go to New York, but did watch his U N speech and Yankee Stadium Mass on TV.

I chose to go to Philadelphia — it was to be a Mass for Priests, and I thought that it was meant for the neighboring areas. What a pleasant surprise when I discovered that it was for priests from the whole country. The largest group of priest concelebrants — every diocese was invited to send one priest representative. As I looked around there were thousands of priests in the Civic Center. The New York Times said there were over 10,000 priests there and 2 or 3,000 sisters. It seemed like more priests and sisters.

May I share some personal thoughts, strictly my own. The Pope spoke in a fatherly way and he said he wanted to talk to his priests — "As Pope, I am your Bishop, with you, I am a Priest." He spoke of the priesthood coming from Jesus Christ not the community and thus the priesthood was permanent, celibate and male. Then he spoke in a fatherly way about unity and faithfulness, and he was very reassuring and supportive. The time was ripe for positive words. He received at least a 15 minute ovation after his homily.

For myself — I welcomed his attention to his priests — The ones who are staying and trying to serve the people. I must confess, I am sick and tired of hearing about the priest who is leaving and the priest who has problems. I am also sick and tired of hearing about the unfaithful husband, the alcoholic wife, the bad child. I think it is time, while always helping anyone in difficulties to publicly honor the faithful father and mother, and the devoted husband and wife, the good children, the dedicated, hard working priests. I think it is time to encourage the many good people in our society; the good in our country. Thank God we have a Pope who will speak for and to the majority. May he be Pope and Pastor of our Church for many years.

On November 2, at our First Friday, we will have Father Tom Smith discuss the "Origin of the Mass" — Come, Pray and Share with us.

In December — I will be the speaker, and in January we will hear about the sacredness of life. Come! FIRST FRIDAYS at 8 p.m. Bring a friend.

Church. Material matters were handled by lay persons in the early Church. The homes of Christian lay persons were the first churches, and Masses were celebrated and instructions given in their homes. And millions of lay persons gave their lives in witness to the faith. "The blood of martyrs became the seed of Christians."

2. Through the long history of the Catholic Church, lay persons have made a valuable contribution. Emperor Constantine, the Great, did a magnificent service to the Church in embracing the Faith and establishing religious freedom in the Roman Empire. And how many times civilization has been saved through the combined efforts of the Catholic clergy and the Catholic laity. It is not presumptuous to say that without lay activity in the Church, the Mystical Body of Christ would not be as alive and vibrant as it is today. We know that Christ will be with His Church to the end of time. Certainly this tiny mustard seed could not have grown into a mighty tree without divine assistance. But we all are members of the Catholic Church, all serving in a capacity that is unique to us, each making a contribution to the growth of the Mystical Body of Christ, just as all the members of our body, each having its own unique function, but all making a contribution to the health, growth and development of the body.

3. The fundamental unit of the Church's organization has been the parish. All Catholics belong to a parish. The pastor and his assistants or associate pastors are the leaders on the parish level. They are representatives of Christ, and they share in His priesthood. They participate in the mission of the Bishops. They are to give guidance in faith and morals. Their purpose is to be servants of the people of God. But lay persons can help them to form the parish into vibrant cells of the Mystical Body of Christ by giving them complete loyalty and assistance in developing and maintaining the parish, thus leaving to the priests more time and freedom in administering to the spiritual needs of the parishioners.

4. The laymen and laywomen of the parish should belong to parish organizations, principal among which is the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine. This parish society was commanded by Canon Law to be established in every parish of the world to aid in teaching of Christian Doctrine, especially to the children. It assumes greater importance today when the shortage of priests and religious is reaching a crisis.

5. Catholic men, women and youth are urged to join other parish organizations which are so helpful to the Church and to the members themselves. And all Catholic men, who practice their religion faithfully and are thus Catholics in good standing, are urged to become members of the Knights of Columbus, an organization which besides giving aid to members and their families, espouses so many programs helpful to the Church, so much so that the Knights of Columbus now enjoy the appellation of the "Right Arm of the Catholic Church." Members are proud of it; all eligible non-members should join it.

## How to Kill Your Council

1. Don't come to meetings, but if you do, be late.
2. If the weather doesn't suit you, don't think of coming.
3. Find fault with the work of your officers and members.
4. Never accept an office, for it's easier to criticize than to do things.
5. If asked by the director or chairman to give your opinion regarding some important matter, tell him you have nothing to say. After the meeting, tell everyone how things ought to be done.

11. Get all the organization give you, but don't give it anything in return.
