A Letter to the Editor of: "K of C Digest"

We were recently requested by our Pastor in the Weekly Bulletin of the Immaculate Conception Church in Elizabeth, to write to our U.S. Senators in protest of a proposed bill, introduced in the Senate through the influence of that Arch Atheist Madelyn Murray. This Bill #RM2493 would ban all religious programs from radio or television broadcasts.

Murray, you will recall, is the one responsible for removal of prayers from our public schools.

I attach a copy of the letter I wrote to Senators Williams and Case with hopes that you will print it as a model which can be used by many of our Council 4504 members, to let our elected representatives know of our feelings on the matter.

Dear Senator Williams:

As a constituent, I strongly protest to you against the proposed Anti-Religious Bill #RM-2493. The intent of this bill is to eliminate all religious programs from radio and television. I urge you to vote against its passage.

In recent years there has been a breakdown in the moral values and standards of our Country, particularly among the younger generation. The elimination of prayer from our schools, the freedom given by the Courts in regard to disrespect of our Flag, Supreme Court decisions protecting rights of criminals and giving legal license to pornographers have been the major contributors to this breakdown.

Somewhere this unravelling of the Country's morality has to stop. Hopefully, the defeat of this proposed atheistic bill can be the start to remove all vestiges of religion from our public life, can only further the breakdown of our moral structure and hasten the destruction of our free Society in the

This is a stated objective of our communist enemies. If it succeeds, Marx, Engels, Stalin, et. al. will surely chuckle in Hell!


Cardinal's Corner

Cardinal Newman wrote,

"Man is **not** a reasoning animal. He is a seeing, feeling, contemplating, acting animal! The heart is commonly reached not through reason but through direct impressions. The sight of belief in others is next to seeing yourself. **Holiness embodied in personal form not in abstract propositions,** converts and holds the world to Christ. Its force is next only to that of the grace of God.

That is the impact of a Mother Theresa of Calcutta. She and her followers collect the dying from the street so that they may leave life in peace among friends. They rescue abandoned newborn babies, nurse them to health, find homes for them. They seek out the deceased and the hurt, sponging maggot-bloated wounds as if — an image that sustains them — they were sponging the wounds of Jesus.

There are lonely, sick, frustrated, angry, abandoned people of all ages around us. There are those in hospitals, nursing homes, senior citizen homes, those in prison or emotionally disturbed waiting for our loving care.

Come, pray that we will become sensitive to each other — that we will see Jesus in everyone and be blind to everything else.
