Our First Friday session on April 7 will feature Father Armand of St. John the Baptist Church in New York City. He will tell us about the life and sainthood of Padre Pio. Father Armand is a missionary priest and is dedicated to spreading devotion to Padre Pio who died in 1968 and was canonized in 1972. Padre Pio was also a missionary attached to a monastery in Foggia, Italy. He bore all the stigmata of Christ and bled every Good Friday. It is said that his body exuded the fragrance of roses. His speedy canonization bears witness to the many signs of his saintly character including numerous miracles. Father Armand's talk will include movies and documentary information.

For the First Friday on May 5, our guests will be Past State Deputy Ray O'Brien and his wife Betty. They will present a two part program dealing with — (1) The Marriage Encounter and — (2) Information relating to the formation of a new organization dealing with Parental Rights.

Both sessions hold promise as being very interesting and inspiring topics and we look forward to seeing you on both evenings.

Pictured above is Union Township Police Chief Donald Ebert, Brother Ed Denner, Jr., Deputy Chief Joseph W. Kitchell, and Grand Knight Kenneth Pinney. The occasion was the annual Policeman of the Year Award and Deputy Chief Kitchell was a most worthy recipient for 1978.

Deputy Chief Kitchell began his career with the Union Police Department in 1941 as a foot patrolman. After seeing active duty in World War II he rose quickly in the department becoming a detective in 1948 and a sergeant in 1950. He was appointed captain in 1956 and in 1975 became Acting Deputy Chief.

Deputy Chief Kitchell has served Union Township in ways too numerous to mention. Some highlights would include the special commendation he received in 1953 for the outstanding work he did on the Monabag Case. A year later he worked extensively with the prosecutor's office in solving a robbery murder at the Tuscan Dairy. He has served us also in other ways most notably in 1974 when he was appointed a member of the then newly formed Senior Citizen's Committee.

Union Council 4504 is proud to honor this dedicated career policeman for his outstanding service. We wish him well in his upcoming retirement years.

## Memories

On November 3, 1958 a special meeting was held for the purpose of holding an open forum on how to form a Columbian Club. G. K. Howard Leary introduced the guest speaker, William Farley, of Elizabeth Council #253. Mr. Farley advised that the first step would be to adopt a resolution to form a Columbian Club, to be followed by the election of officers who would operate independently of the council. There should be seven officers consisting of a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and three controllers. He noted that it would cost approximately \$3.50 per member per year to operate and maintain a clubhouse. He stated income could be derived from such sources as a bowling alley, a bar, and food service. He suggested that a house party could be held once a month with only members in good standing permitted to attend. He stated a savings and checking account would be in order as well as by-laws to govern the conduct of the club business. Pointing out that officers should be elected and not appointed, he said a president should be elected who in turn would appoint a nominating committee to search out and suggest talent to fill the other vacant officer slots. An election would then be held to formalize the slate of officers. He pointed out that any officer who missed two consecutive meetings would be automatically suspended, according to the approved by-laws of the Elizabeth Columbian Club.

Following his address many questions were asked of and answered by Mr. Farley. In summation Mr. Farley suggested we build with an eye to the future so our sons might enjoy the fruits of our labor. He also noted that when intelligent men discuss any matter there will always be differences of opinion, pointing out that this is a healthy condition. He finally thanked the council for asking him to participate in our forum.

Grand Knight Leary introduced District Deputy Frank Jackiewicz and Reverend Father Palasits, both of whom endorsed the idea of a Columbian Club.

Chaplain Father Driscoll, in supporting the idea, admonished the members to select responsible and talented men to be officers and to be in agreement on all facets of the proposal before making any funds available. He spoke of Father Begley and the program which he conducted in building St. Michaels.

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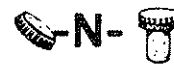
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## Personality Profile Christopher Columbus (Part Six)

In the words of Columbus, he found that the natives on his newly discovered land "had a firm belief that all good things are in heaven, and that I descended from Thence with these ships and sailors, and under this impression I was received after they had thrown aside their fears." "Nor are they slow or stupid, but of clear understanding. They never saw any people clothed, nor any ships like ours." Believing that he was on an island near the eastern end of India, Columbus called these natives "Indians". The name was generally used in Europe before the nature of the New World became evident. By that time the natives of both North America and South America were habitually called indians and the name stuck. The landing of the famous navigator began what is known as modern history. History has shown it was more important to the human race that Christopher Columbus discovered America than a new ocean route to India. Columbus and his men were greatly impressed by the beauty of their sunny islands. The admiral showed the skill of a master seaman by his navigation of these new waters. Many ships in more modern times have come to grief even though they were well surveyed in this same sea. Columbus stopped at other islands in the Bahamas, Cuba, and Haiti area. Deeply religious, he named the first after the Blessed Saviour and the second for the Blessed Virgin (Santa Maria de la Concepcion). The next two were named for Ferdinand and Isabella. At the end of December, Christopher established a settlement on the islands and had no trouble getting volunteers among the men. The vision of pleasant living among hospitable natives not far from the islands source of gold was a lure that few could resist. On January 16th, the Admiral set out for the return voyage to Spain. On the return Columbus survived one of the roughest winters ever recorded in the stormy Atlantic. Finally, on the 15th day of February they sighted Santa Clara, a small island in the Azores. After a stay at the Azores he sailed to Portugal. How triumphant he must have felt as he came to safe harbor as admiring fishermen watched from the cliffs of the Portuguese coast. From Portugal he went to Spain. The magnificence of his discovery coming so soon after the Spanish victory at Granada was looked upon as a reward for the piety of Ferdinand and Isabella. Everywhere Columbus went he was acclaimed and honored. The king and queen, surrounded by all the dignitaries of their court, received their "Admiral of the Oceans" with the highest of honors. They listened eagerly as he told of the glories of their new empire, and concluded the ceremony with fervent prayers.

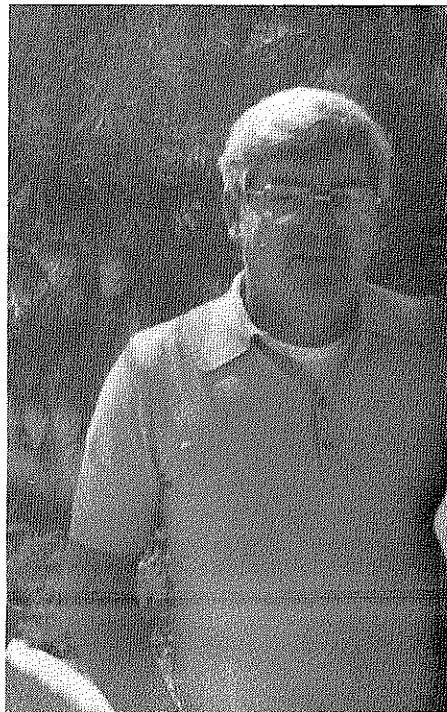

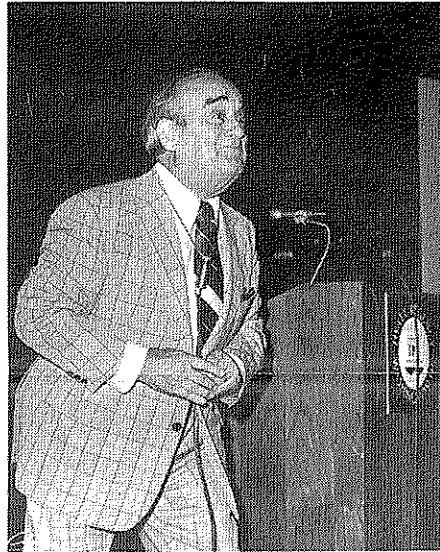
## Notice

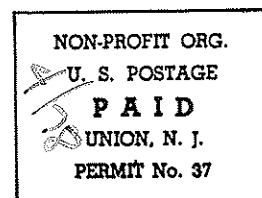
The season is going to start in mid May and I shall post a schedule for both teams shortly on the bulletin board outside the bar.
