

Did You Know?

The Senate recently voted to table a proposed constitutional amendment to bar abortions by a 47 to 40 vote. Some of the names to remember as friends to our movement are Senator Jessie Helms (D.N.C.) who sponsored the constitutional amendment to ban abortion.

Senator James Buckley (R.N.Y.) who has a substitute amendment to ban abortion except in case of risk to the life of the mother or to leave the matter up to the States.

Senator Edward Kennedy (D. Mass.) who voted not to table the amendment and other Senators who are supporting our cause.

The Foes who fight hard to have the abortion laws stand as they are, must also be clearly identified.

Let us talk it up among our friends and keep the issue alive so that respect for human dignity can once again be restored.

Also let us not forget to write a few lines to our legislators to urge them to support the amendment to ban abortion. This is a moral obligation on our part that we must vigorously pursue.

Swim Club Splashes

Some special notes for those new members who has just joined us this year. If you did not receive your Swim Club Membership Certificate when you picked up your badges, please inquire at the gate-house concerning same.

Our badge system is designed to facilitate the movement of our people and to ease the burden on the pool manager and his staff as well as the board of directors. Children who have been issued red lettered octagon shaped badges must remain in the shallow end of the pool. That is between the end of the pool at the locker rooms and the first safety rope across the pool had badges indicate to all, that the child had not passed the required swimming test allowing him free access to all areas of the pool. The child may take the deep water test at the convenience of the pool manager and his staff. Upon succession cessfully passing the deep water test, the child should present his red badge to the attendant at the gatehouse, who will replace it with a badge denoting the child's age and bearing his name. He is now permitted to swim anywhere and to use the diving boards. This test is required of all children through 11 years of age and we urge parents of children who can not swim, to enroll the child for swimming instructions. It is imperative that all children learn to swim at the earliest opportunity. The next age group badge is from 12 years of age through 15. The reason for this group is to indicate they are not yet in the adult classification but can attend the pool on their own. All children under the age of 12 must be accompanied by an adult while in the pool area. This rule applies to the age group 12 to 15 also after 5 p.m. The final age group for badges is adult or 16 years of age and over. Only those with adult badges are allowed on the sun deck over the locker rooms. It may be noted that some young adult badges have two holes punched in them. This is to indicate they have not yet reached the legal adult age of 18 years. We do this because of the alcoholic beverages dispensed at the snack bar. The badge indicates to the people serving such beverages whether or not one is of legal age at a glance, although further proof may be required at the discretion of the bartender.

Please see that each member reads and understands the few simple rules which govern the conduct of our members while on K of C property. Compliance with these rules will help to assure us of a safe and enjoyable season of swimming pleasure.

The pool will open on a daily basis on the Monday immediately following the closing of school.

The dates for the two council days at the pool are THURSDAY, JULY 15 with a rain date on July 16, and WED-NESDAY, AUGUST 18, with a rain date on August 19. On council days any member of Union Council may enjoy the facilities of the Swim Club simply by presenting the members dues card at the gate-house on the two appointed days. All of the member's family who live in his household are also invited to share a day's fun with us. If the member is working that day, be sure he leaves his dues card for the rest of the family. He can join them after work. Pool hours are 12:00 noon til 8:00 p.m.
