## SEASON'S FINALE FOR COUNCIL ACTIVITY COMMITTEE

The 1959-1960 fiscal year is rapidly drawing to a close. So too, the program of your Council Activity Committee must of necessity also come to an end. This will occur with the Family Picnic, on Sunday, June 26, at Angeles Grove, Union.

In outlining its plans, Chairman Bill Taylor stated, "In order to bring the price of the Family Picnic within the financial range of the entire membership, we have proposed, through the introduction of a resolution at two regular meetings, to have the Council absorb the \$2.00 admission price of children (of Council members only) up to the age of twelve years. In addition to this, we have also asked the Council to absorb \$2.50 of the admission price of children from twelve years of age through high school. In effect, this is what the picnic would cost: \$5.00 per adult, \$2.00 per child, from age twelve through high school, and free admission for children up to age twelve. The committee feels that such an arrangement, while expensive to the Council, would afford a great many brothers with children an opportunity to attend the picnic. We feel that the Family Picnic should be just that, and a brother should not be penalized by virtue of having a large family."

"We fully realize, of course, that it is impossible to please everyone, but we sincerely hope, in this manner, to satisfy the majority. This arrangement is tentative, depending upon whether or not the Council votes favorably upon the resolution. However, each member will receive a letter outlining the final and definite details."

Angeles Grove is located at Liberty and Allen Ave., Union. There is a covered pavilion, baseball field, horse shoes, ping pong, etc. Activities are scheduled for both adults and children. The menu will include clams on the half shell, clam broth, clam chowder, hamburgers, frankfurters, hot roast beef sandwiches, salads, corn, beer, birch beer, and coffee. The affair will be open to non-members, but they, of course, must pay full price: \$5.00 each per adult, or child twelve years of age through high school, and \$2.00 per child up to twelve years old.

Come one! Come all! Enjoy our final affair of the season.


