Scholastic - Need

The Scholarship Committee of Union Council is now accepting applications for the annual scholar-ships for the 1970-1971 school year. The closing date for the applications will be June 1. Early filing with the committee will be appreciated because certain confidential information must be obtained to aid in a fair determination of the worthy recipients.

The scholarships are available to one boy and one girl each year. To qualify, the applicant must be the child or brother or sister of a member in good standing or a deceased member of this Council. They must pass the Archdiocesan High School entrance examination and be accepted by a Catholic High School.
Preference for the scholarships will be decided by the committee on the basis of need as well as scholastic ability.

The recipients of the \$150 scholarships will be awarded a like amount each year upon proof of satisfactory fulfillment of the scholastic requirements of the high school.

The guest speaker at the May 11th meeting will be Patrick J. O'Reilly, State Secretary of the Knights of Columbus. Currently completing his second term in the second highest position in the State Council, Pat will be elected to the post of State Deputy five days after his appearance in Union.

Chaplain's Corner

Rev. John A. Palasits

The following is a message from Father Paschal Botz, O.S.B. on the subject of Christian Marriage:

A human society which has lost its faith is constantly perverting the God-made meaning of marriage. Christ has given the key to its meaning and value to His Church: "This is a great mystery, and I mean in reference to Christ and the Church". The inner beauty and dignity of marriage consist in expressing the love and unity between Christ and His Church. Speaking of the married, Paul begins by saying: "Be subject to one another out of reverence for Christ." The Christian married couple could well spend some moments each day thinking of the Presence of Christ in their lives, how He continues to ennoble human love, how He holds them in His hands till the end of their life, how He continues to sanctify their person and state every day.

There exists in the world today Christian married couples who are aware of the sacramentality of their state, aware of the Presence of Christ, whose homes are true centers of redemptive blessings, who strive to perfect themselves and others in love, who are a true leaven in society. They truly witness to Christ, and their fidelity is proof of all that Christ said and promised to those who belong to Him in faith and charity. Coming from the altar, they constantly return there as to the source of their marital identity and strength—to be with Christ!

True faith in the Christian mystery of matrimony tells the married couple that Christ and the Church are no thief of natural pleasure and happiness. They realize that God's blessing rests on being fully and truly human in this state. The body and its powers and pleasures are not isolated and absolute in human or Christian marriage. There is more to love and marriage than sex. The total human person is greater than the sex drive with all its purpose. Sex is an instrument of love, to be guided and inspired by truth, the human and devine truth. Powerful though it be, sex is still an impulse that needs guidance and self-control.

The modern world, unbridled in its sex freedom, is a sick world that needs more than medical advice. It needs the Word and example of Christ, who protects life, who lifts human erotic powers to a high human level, above brutal and animal selfishness. While raising marriage to this high ideal, and while uniting the married as a majority in His following, He yet chose for Himself

the way of blessed, chaste celibacy. Without contradiction He is the ideal in love, reverence and friendship for all, for those who are fruitful in marriage and those fruitful in celibacy.

Attention Hollywood

In a recent issue of Variety, the show business newspaper, it listed the top moneymaking pictures of 1969 in the United States and Canada. Number one was "The Love Bug" a Walt Disney movie. This is a picture without nudity or steaming sex. Among the top ten moneymakers only one movie was rated X. In some there were frank passages, a bedroom scene, and some salty language, but most of the top ten movies of 1969 were for the general audiences. In these days when Hollywood studios are laying off workers, losing millions of dollars (one studio lost 33 million in nine months) and going into debt they better turn to stories suitable to large not limited audiences. Only the Disney studies, with it's traditional family films is doing fine. It's earnings were up 21% last year. Moviegoers paid \$1 billion in 1969 for movie admissions. For that kind of money most people are not willing to accept poor stories, held together by explicit love making scenes.
