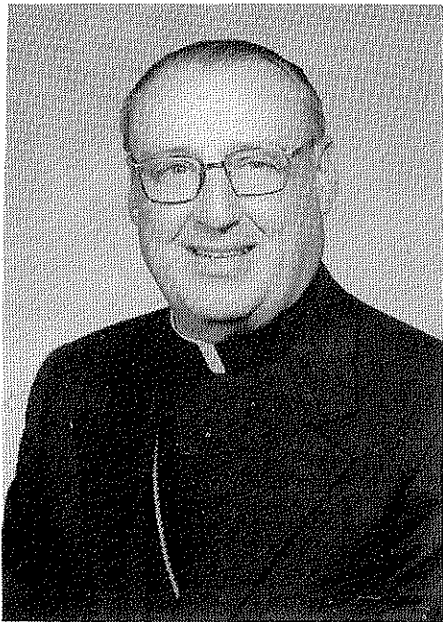
## LOCAL K. OF C. MARCH ON WASHINGTON

Members of Union Council 4504, of the Knights of Columbus, will be among more than 100,000 people expected to participate in the March for Life in Washington, D.C., on Thursday, January 22. Last year, more than 50 people signed up. Hopefully this year, the interest in the march will exceed that of last year's, especially since the winning party has endorsed the pro-life position, and we must remind those candidates of the pledges and promises they have made during the campaign.

This will be the eighth national March for Life conducted in the nation's capital to petition Congress for a Human Life Amendment to the Constitution that will reverse the Supreme Court ruling of January 22, 1973, permitting abortion for any reason. This will mark the third year that the Union Council will send its own bus. It is expected that over 250 buses will be sponsored by the New Jersey Knights of Columbus this year. It is also expected that the presence of Union Council's members will be noted by our representatives at the march.

## Right to Life

In its April, 1980 Newsletter, Morality in Media carried the warning that S1722, the bill that would revise the entire Federal Criminal Code, and which is scheduled to come up for consideration by the full Senate when it convenes, contains obscenity sections that would water down the present obscenity laws to such an extent that federal prosecutions under them would be all but non-existent. MM suggested that all concerned citizens contact their U. S. Senators and alert them to the obscenity sections of this bill. It suggests that they request their Senators to see that the bill does not pass until the obscenity sections are revised to comply with the definition of obscenity as it presently exists (as defined by U. S. Supreme Court in Miller vs. California).

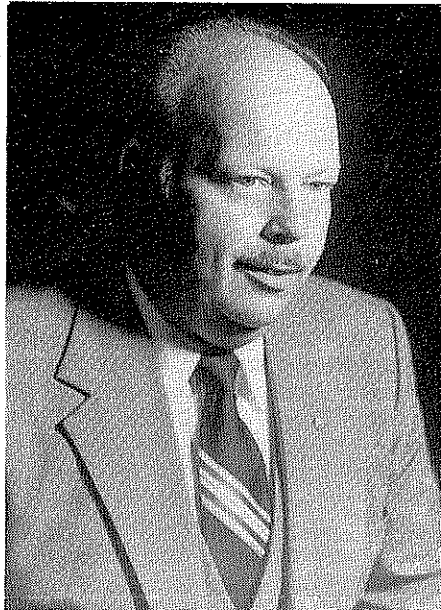

### DEAR WORLD . . .

My young son starts to school today. It's all going to be sort of strange and new to him for awhile, and I wish you would sort of treat him gently. You see, up to now he's been king of the roost . . . He's been boss of the backyard . . . His mother has always been near to soothe his wounds and repair his feelings.

But now things are going to be different.

This morning he's going to walk down the front steps, wave his hand and start out on the great adventure . . . it is an adventure that might take him across continents, across oceans . . . 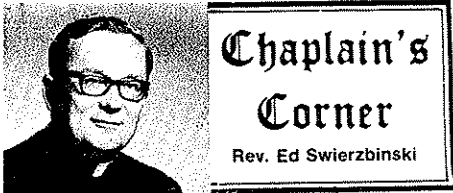
This is quite an order, World, but see what you can do . . . He's such a nice little fellow, my son!

From time to time I pick up a book 'PSALMS NOW.' The author is Leslie Brandt. He takes the psalms and expresses their thoughts in more modern circumstances. He speaks not of farm or military — he speaks of the cold, unfriendly city, the indifference of believers towards their neighbors. I have compared the usual translation with his and was impressed with his faithfulness to the psalmist. They have made the psalms more prayerful to me. For example: Ps. 106 —

How I praise God today  
How exciting it is to be His son and servant.

What is amazing to me  
is the manner in which He makes  
hay out of straw,  
and stubble out of my feeble efforts  
and foolish errors.

Do you have doubts about the future?  
Ps. 117--118 we read:

what may happen to me and my world.  
I keep telling myself  
**WITH THE LORD ON MY SIDE

ideas from Ps. 122-123

How good it is to enter the sanctuary  
of the Lord!

I know that God is not confined  
within man's four-walled creations,  
nor is He attached to altars and brass  
symbols.

fulfilling.

God is with me and about me.  
even as I make my way

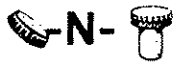

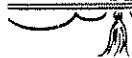
