

### "KNIGHT OF THE YEAR"



The selection of Walter S. Wasowski as "Union Council 4504 Knight of the Year" is a deserved tribute to his many years of dedication and services to Union Counneil 4504 and the Knights of Columbus.

Walter, who joined the Council in 1958, started working on the Membership Committee and Catholic Activities Committee, and held the position of Catholic Activities Committee Chairman under P. G. K. John Zimmerman.

In 1961, Walter was elected to the position of Outside Guard, and this started him on his way up the ladder through positions such as Recorder, Warden Chancellor, Deputy Grand Knight, and finally Grand Knight in 1966-67.

During the years in the chair positions, Union Council won four successive ceremonial awards. After serving as Grand Knight, he became Chairman of the First Cultural Event, sponsored by Union Council, "The Don Cossack Chorus Concert."

During his years at Union Council he has served the Columbian Club in many ways. Whenever there was work to be done, you can rest assured he was there.

Walter served on the original fund raising drive, and he has participated in the many major improvements that have been made in the Club over the years.

He is an active member of the Columbian Swim Club, and is one of the top three for work party attendance.

This year Walter is serving his final year as a trustee. He is lecturer of the Council, and has served as Chairman of the Notre Dame Glee Club Concert.

He is accountant for the Columbian Club and a member of the Board of Governors for the Swim Club. Walter has also been active in ceremonial work, and has participated in all degrees. The latest achievement is his elevation to the position of District Deputy. Walt has also been a mainstay at Saint Michael's Parish. He is a member of the Holy Name Society. He has served as souvenir journal chairman for the parish plays for three years, and has been Lector-Commentator since the inception of that program.

### Diary Of An Unborn Child

The following poignant story was first used by Cardinal Wyszynski of Warsaw many years ago as a pastoral against abortion. It has particular relevance today, with recurring efforts in many States to allow abortion practically at will, and seeking to gloss over what abortion really means.

Here is "The Diary of an Unborn Child":

- Oct. 5 Today my life began. My parents do not know it yet. I am as small as an apple seed, but it is already I. The whole big world cannot say I, but I can.
- Oct. 19 I have grown a little, but I am still too small to do anything by myself. My mother does just about everything for me. Some say that I am not a real person yet, that only my mother exists. But I am a real person, just as a small crumb of bread is truly bread. My mother is. And I am.
- Nov. 2 I am growing a bit every day. My arms and legs are beginning to take shape. Even if I were to be born deformed, without arms and legs, I could have artificial ones, as grown people sometimes have and, even at the worst, I would be I, ready to have water poured on my head so that I can see God.
- Nov. 20 It wasn't until today that the doctor told Mom that I am living here under her heart. She is helping me already; she is even feeding me with her own blood. She is so good.
- Dec. 10 My hair is growing. It is smooth and shiny. I wonder what kind of hair Mom has?
- Dec. 13 I am just about able to see. It is dark around me. When Mom brings me into the world, it will be full of sunshine and flowers. I have never seen a flower, but what I want more than anything is to see my Mom. How do you look, Mom?
- Dec. 24 I wonder if Mom hears the whispering beat of my heart? Some children come into the world a little sick and then the delicate hands of the doctor performs miracles to bring them to health. But my heart is strong and healthy. You will have a healthy little daughter, Mom!
- Dec. 28 Today my mother killed me.
