OPEN MEETING HELD

The Decent Literature Campaign, under Chairman, Past Grand Knight John Zimmerman, got off to a fine start on Thursday, March 1, 1962 at an open meeting held at the Council Home. Representatives of various organizations in the town, as well as many members and their wives, were present.

The assembly was addressed by Postmaster Jule A. Douglass, Assemblywoman Mary B. Hughes, Detective Art Magnusson and Township Committeeman James C. Conlon.

All those present were requested to contact their legislators to support the passage of a bill which Mrs. Hughes has pending, permitting the law enforcement agencies greater authority in coping with purveyors of smut literature. Mrs. Douglass explained the part the Post Office Department is playing in curbing the use of the mails by these super salesmen of pornography.

Mr. Magnusson gave a detailed report on what the law enforcement

agents are doing to combat these sales.

Chairman John Zimmerman requested those present to form a committee

to combat the sale of smut to the youth of our town.

Police Commissioner James \hat{C} . Conlon promised the full support of his Department to the cause.

Chaplain's Corner

A man is measured by his fellows not by the promises that he makes but by the promises that he keeps..

This rule is universally accepted in the world of man each day. We should allow it to be the premise of our present consideration. Knights of Columbus are men who have been attentive for long years to the call of Mother Church for a spirit of penance during the Holy Season of Lent. Each one can now recall the varied degrees of response he himself has made in observing, first of all, that which is commanded, and, secondly, the recommendations of prayer and penance. Reflection on the past should be but brief. These thoughts only have worth if they influence our greater faithfulness in the current Lenten season.

It is well for us to be on the alert to the listing of the days of fast and abstinence as recorded in our parish bulletin. If in the past we have been only slightly interested we should reflect now on the very reasons why we should deny ourselves. For it is our own personal responsibility to become more closely associated with Christ by putting on His own mentality as He prepared for the taking of His cross.

Communion Breakfast

On Sunday, March 25, 1962, our Council will hold its Fifth Annual Father and Son Communion Breakfast. Since this is one of the most important spiritual events of the season, all members are cordially invited and are urged to set aside this one morning of the year to partake of the Holy Eucharist, in a body, with their brother knights and sons.

Holy Mass will be celebrated at 8:05 A.M. in St. Michael's Lower Church. Members and their guests are asked to assemble in the school hall at 7:45 A.M. in order that all may march, in a group, to the Church. The Honor Guard provided by the John Dawson Gilmary Shea General Assembly, Fourth Degree, Co. "H", 1st New Jersey Regiment, will add dignity and color to our program.

Following the Mass, the Breakfast will be served in our Clubhouse on Jeanette Avenue. Toastmaster will be our own lecturer, Brother Fred Vollherbst. The principal speaker will be the Rev. Thomas J. Donnelly, Pastor of the Immaculate Conception parish

The 14 stations gradually tell the story how the son of God took the sins of the man who is making the stations and, with His death, the same Lord has won the forgiveness of his sins.

The stations completed, that man, a Knight of Columbus, should kneel again before the Lord and remind himself that he was made a knight in the service of the dead King. Words should then come from the fullness of a contrite heart. Remember well then, that Christ will deal with you after the fashion of men's dealing. He will measure you, not by the promises you make, but by the promises you keep.
